MR. CAMPBELL'S RESOLUTION.

The statements set forth in Mr. Campbell's resolution are substantially true. It is a fact that the Liberals obtained power on their promise to make ends meet by the exercise of economy and by good management; it is a fact that the Liberals have, instead, increased expenditures, wasted resources, and added deficit to deficit, so that now the public debt aggregates half a million dollars and the interest charge is about \$20,000 per year. It is a fact that upon the completion of the Hillsborough bridge and other public works and buildings required by the province, the liability will be almost doubled. These facts having been established, Mr. Campbell's demand for a special committee to ascertain the financial situation of the province and suggest a new policy to make ends meet is but reasonable. It is certain that ruin, absolute and irreparable, must result from a continuance in the present course. Yet Mr. Campbell's resolution will certainly be voted down by the majority of the Legislature. But we doubt the ability of Mr. Farquharson to commend the absolute obedience of all his Liberal followers in this regard. Mr. Wise, for instance, knows the truth of what we have stated and appreciates the hazard that the Province is running. He has, moreover, notwithstanding his trip to England shown a disposition to stand by his fellow farmers, rather than with a government whose avowed policy is the issue this year of \$26,000 worth of new debentures as well as the addition of \$14,500 to taxation. Will he oppose Mr. Campbell's resolution? We shall see. There are others on the Government side of the House, who ought to be able to see that their own interests, as well as the interests of the Province at large, will be conserved only by a movement such as Mr. Campbell advocates. The able and vigorous speech delivered by Mr. Campbell was calculated to enforce this truth.

THE SENATE RESOLUTION.

The Leader of the Government has given notice of a resolution calling upon the Imperial Parliament to handicap the Senate after the manner lately proposed by Sir Wilfrid Laurier. He has not yet ventured to submit the resolution, and it is possible that he has reconsidered the matter. This Province certainly has cause to be thankful to the Senate for having preserved the franchise for our young men, and for having so amended the present election law as to render it workable here. For the smaller provinces, the Senate is the only protection in the last resort. It would be simple madness, from our point of view, to pass the resolution of which the Leader of the Government has given notice. A few days ago, in response to an application for a much less important constitutional change, Sir Wilfrid declared, in effect, that such changes ought not to be lightly made,—ought to be made only upon the most weighty considerations of necessity. What necessity is there to give the House of Commons power to override the Senate and to destroy the independence of the Upper House? None whatever. The Senate saved the country nearly a million of dollars in respect to the Drum-

mond Railway deal, and a territory three times as large as the whole of Prince Edward Island—a territory believed to abound in precious metals—in respect to the M. Kenzie-Mann contract. The Government has not dared to submit the Senate's action concerning either of these matters to the test of a general election. There is, consequently, no ground whatever for the statement that the Senate is not in accord with public opinion, and no cause for the passage of the resolution of which Mr. Farquharson has given notice.

If the resolution should be pressed and passed in spite of every reasonable suggestion to the contrary, we hope that a popular counter-acting petition will be circulated and signed.

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

—Messrs Flint and Bell of the House of Commons have given notice of a resolution providing prohibition for the Provinces. It is not likely to come practically to anything.

—The Summerside correspondent of the Guardian remarks that "the esteemed editor of the Pioneer is having a visionary spell. He has 'been seeing things.' The Farmer of to-day, dated yesterday, announces the fact that 'the surveying steamer Guinare arrived at Summerside last Saturday, and is engaged in making tidal observations and other work in the harbor.' The Guinare has not yet arrived in Summerside harbor, but is expected this week." It is the custom of the Liberal press to draw upon imagination for that which is lacking in facts.

ESTEEMED EXCHANGES.

Montreal Gazette: "The McGill authorities have made a great score by being the first to give academical recognition to Mr. Rudyard Kipling's services to literature and the Empire. It is to be hoped that they will enable Montreal to do itself the further honor of expressing to Mr. Kipling our appreciation of his work by popular acclaim as well as university distinctions. It would be a thousand pities for the degree to be conferred in absentia. A postponement till next fall, or even till next year, would be preferable."

Montreal Star: The Ministers would, no doubt, find their path smoother if they cackled less over the reduction in the average rate of duty of something less than one per cent., which, according to their own returns, they have accomplished. They would have been wiser had they frankly admitted that they have learned something through the responsibilities of office. By the time they have to face the electorate they will have enough sins and follies to answer for, without pretending to be fools on the tariff question. It was never more evident than it is to-day that the people of Canada are determined upon the protection of Canadian industries.

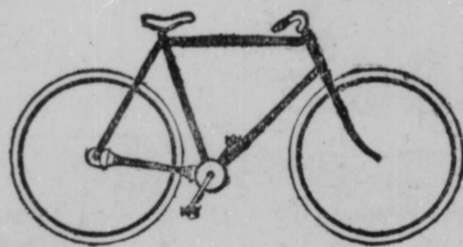
