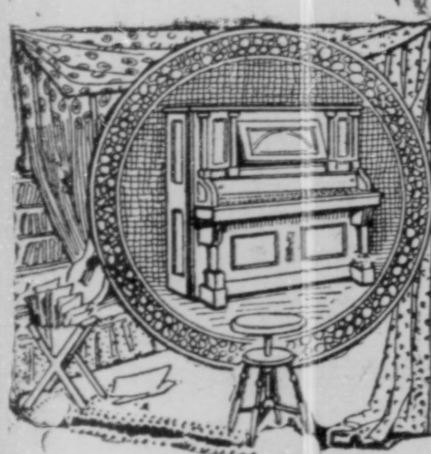

A BIG DAY IN CHARLOTTETOWN

Closing Scenes of the Celebration

IN HONOR OF THE RELIEF OF LADYSMITH.

Torchlight Procession, Fireworks Display and Bonfire.

The loyal people of Charlottetown last evening celebrated the relief of Ladysmith in a right royal manner. The biting easterly wind and the snow that was falling did not seem to cool their ardor in the least. From every point of view the celebration of yesterday is one to be remembered for many a day.

Long before eight o'clock crowds of men, women and children were about the streets, and by the time the torchlight procession was ready to leave City Hall Queen Street, from the starting point away below the market building, was thronged with people eager to see the demonstration of patriotism.

A few minutes after eight the procession, which was under the direction of Col. Moore, left City Hall. The procession was headed by Mr. W. F. Robins, mounted on a white horse. Then came the Artillery Band followed by the Artillery, Engineers and 82nd Battalion. Carriages containing Mayor Warburton and the City Councillors followed, after which came the firemen with apparatus, preceded by Chief Engineer Large and Assistant Chief Hermans in a carriage. The students of Prince of Wales College and of St. Dunstan's College marched next, headed by the band of St. Dunstan's College. The Sons of England, the Caledonian Club, the Boys Brigade of St. James' Church, and the Benevolent Irish Society came next in order, the Club marching to the music of the pipes and the Irish Society to the playing of the League of the Cross Band. The procession was ended by two large wagons bearing the inscriptions "On to Mafeking" and "On to Pretoria," from which rifle shots and fireworks were sent out. These wagons were intended to represent armored trains, and were the idea of Mr. H. J. Mackenzie, C. E.

The route of the procession was through the principal streets of the city, dispersing on Market Square where there was a bonfire. The firemen carried torches, and fireworks were set off as the procession moved along. The different societies carried patriotic flags and banners, and as the march proceeded cheer after cheer was given by the citizens who viewed the proceedings with great pleasure.

There were also displays of fireworks from many places of business and private houses.

The illumination of public buildings, places of business and private residences was highly creditable when the short time allowed for preparation is taken into consideration. The Provincial Building, Law Courts, Market House, Post Office and City Building were all well illuminated, as were also the stores, schools and bank buildings in the vicinity of the Square. Nearly every house along the route of the procession was also lighted, as were many residences on streets along which the procession did not pass. Several of the stores had their show windows decorated especially for the occasion, those of James Paton & Co., L. W. Watson, T. J. Harris, Alley & Co., Seaton, McLeod & Co. and Sanderson & Co., being especially admired.

Strings of electric lights were suspended across Queen street where Kent, Grafton and Richmond streets intersect, the one near City Hall having a large pendant.

The bonfire on Market Square kept the large crowd there until a late hour. The band played patriotic airs and the multitude cheered for the Queen, Lord Roberts, General Buller, the Canadian soldiers, etc. The singing of the National Anthem brought the proceedings to a close.

Throughout the day and evening flags floated from every building that could obtain one, those who had no flagstaff flying the colors from their windows. Strings of flags were also hung across the principal streets, and the red, white and blue was everywhere in evidence.

There were also patriotic celebrations at Summerside, Souris, Georgetown, Kensington and other points throughout the province.

It was bugler Ball, of the Engineer Corp., who paraded with the Citizens Band yesterday afternoon. He also marched with the militia in the procession of last evening. Master Balls is said to be the youngest bugler in the Canadian militia.
