## 'Scots Night' Is Planned For Confederation Centre

Mr. Hardy has travelled extensively in North America bringing the romance of history to Canada and the United States with his films.

He will show the films in this year's program with "Holiday Scotland" probably proving a favorite with many viewers with its wide sweep of the entire country beginning with Hermitage Castle on the Borders, through Sterling with its memories of Wallace and Bruce and all around till its ending with the sunset glistening from the waters of the Firth of Clyde to paint the sails of many yachts.

## Auction Series Sees 205 Sold

A total of 205 head of cattle were sold yesterday in the auction series being held weekly at the provincial exhibition grounds. There were 29 calves and 167 steers, heifers, cows, feeders and bulls.

Bidding was brisk, the demand keen and the prices realized were satisfactory, knowledgeable cattlemen said last evening.

Grass calves sold at \$15.75 to \$19.75 a hundredweight. Four or five "very poor" calves sold at 12 to 14 cents a pound. Fat calves sold at \$20 to \$26.75 per hundredweight. Heifer cows (young ones) sold at \$18 to \$21.75 per 100 pounds.

Good cows sold at \$16 to \$18, medium cows at \$14.50 to \$16.00, canners and cutters at \$12 to \$14.50, "light shelly canners"—there were four or five of them—sold at \$8.25 to \$11.50 a hundredweight.

Common steers sold at \$10 to \$21, common heifers brought \$19 to \$20, dairy-type feeders sold at \$15 to \$18 and beef type and beef-cow feeders sold at \$17 to \$22.50. There were a few really good beef feeders.

Bulls sold at \$17 to \$20, the prices in all of these latter cases were based on one hundred pounds. Buyers were present from Moncton, Fredericton, N.B. and Truro, N.S., in addition to local buyers.

## Confederation Centre Has Very Busy October

The financial controversy which swirled around the concrete portals of Confederation Centre during the month of October did not seem to have the slightest effect on the continually rising traffic of people through the National Memorial.

In fact, October was one of the best months (apart from summer months when the population of the province is swollen by the influx of tourists) yet, in terms of people making use of the art gallery, theatre, library and meeting and convention facilities.

In all, an estimated 30,000 people made use of the arts centre during the month, a figure based on box office attendance, regular counts and library circulation figures.

The theatre led the way with over 3,000 people attending attractions that ranged from the hypnotist Reeven to an amateur production of The Dairy of Anne Frank. Other attractions booked during the month included the Neptune Theatre Company, the Community Concert series, the Confederation Centre Film

Society, the Travellers, and first run Hollywood movie features. Student matinees presented by the Neptune Company were especially well attended with overflow houses of 1,000 turning out for each of two performances of Henry IV Part I.

In the library the circulation reached a figure of nearly six thousand, with an estimated nine or ten thousand more people utilizing the reference section and the wide assortment of periodicals. This figure was swelled by the many high school students who regularly make the library a place of study.

The art gallery involved over three thousand patrons with a series of new exhibitions, lectures and special film programs. The art rental service enjoyed another successful month, the pre-school art class operated at capacity, nearly a hundred older children were enrolled in regular instruction periods, and fifty teachers in training attended a special series of instructional classes. Ballet classes accounted for another one hundred and fifty children of all ages.

The meeting and convention facilities attracted everything from a Red Cross blood donor clinic to wedding receptions and meetings of many kinds, adding a further 3,000 people to the grand total.

The total estimated figure of 30,000 achieves greater than passing significance when it is balanced against a total population of Prince Edward Island of about 106,000.

Centre officials are optimistic that the upward trend will continue throughout the winter months.
