Lighting System To Help Golfers

LACHUTE, Que. (CP)—The nocturnal golfer is to be added to Canada's list of sports enthusiasts.

A push club on the outskirts of this agricultural center 45 miles northwest of Montreal is installing a lighting system for night-time play.

After-dark golf of the pitch-and-put variety—where holes are usually restricted in length to 100 yards or so—is not uncommon across Canada.

But this project will be the first on a full-size course where the golfer can let out on his drive from the tee.

It's a \$50,000 venture.

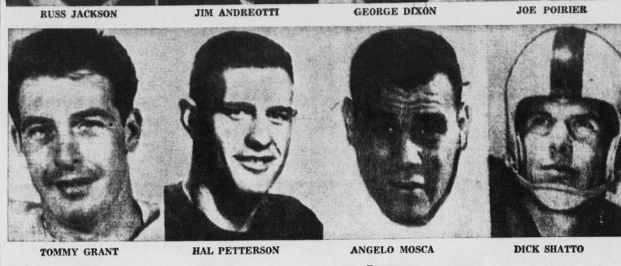
Textile manufacturer Gilbert E. Ayres, president of the 726-member Lachute Golf and Country Club, got the idea while thumbing through a golf magazine that mentioned a successful experiment at a course in California.

Initially the lighting will cover the back nine holes of one course at the 36-hole layout. Club pro Louis de Breyne says the project is aimed at the golfer who works nine to five.

"Normally he only has time to get in nine holes before night-fall. With the lights he'll be able to complete a round of 18."

De Breyne says the system will probably be used only during the four peak months of the golf season. "In the early spring and late fall it gets too dark to play at night."

What happens to a ball that lands next to a light standard? The club has decided that the poles, quite possibly as greenskeeper property. The ball must be lifted and placed two club-lengths away.



Jackson Named To Eastern All-Star Team Again

TORONTO (CP)—Russ Jackson, brilliant young Canadian quarterback with Ottawa Rough Riders, Tuesday was named to the 1963 Eastern Football Conference all-star team for the second successive year. He shared top individual honors with two imports from Montreal Alouettes.

Selection of Jackson for the Football Reporters of Canada team and the unanimous choice of all-star backfield George Dixon and linebacker Jim Andreotti were highlights of the voting. Selectors picked Hamilton Tiger-Cat and Rough Rider players for the backbones of the offensive and defensive squads.

The FRC's team replaces the Canadian senior 'A' star team chosen annually since 1922.

Tickets and Riders, who meet in the two-game total point EFCF final to decide the East's team in the Grey Cup final at Vancouver on Saturday, Nov. 23, provided the personnel for 15 of the 24 positions.

Twenty-four FRC members (football writers and sportscasters in the four league cities)—those eight Ottawa players, equally divided between offensive and defensive lineups, and seven from Hamilton, Tiger-Cats landed four on offence and three on defence.

SIX ALBOS ON TEAM

The Alouettes, knocked out of Grey Cup contention with a 17-0 loss to the Rough Riders last Saturday in the EFCF sudden-death semifinal, were awarded six berths on the mythical team.

Each place stands more than 40 feet high and 100 light spools across the fairways in a diagonal pattern with slightly heavier concentration of candlepower around the greens.

The Riders weren't even considered by the experts for a place in the EFCF's three-team playoffs in pre-season forecasts but Jackson's outstanding work played a big part in the club's second-place final standing.

The voters noted all of this and gave him an almost-solid vote of confidence as the all-star quarter. He received 18 votes. Veteran Bernie Faloney of the Tiger-Cats, the only other player considered, got six.

MORE HONORS AHEAD?

Now, Jackson is shooting for two more honors. He had been named earlier as the East's outstanding player and outstanding Canadian in the CFL. Results of the final ballot of this award will be announced Thursday, Nov. 23.

Dixon, a spectacular break-away runner and the league's leading ground gainer the last two seasons, was also an unanimous choice in 1961. Last year he won additional honors as the outstanding player in the country.

McPhee Says Referees Have Been Negligent

MONCTON (CP)—Playing coach Doug McPhee of the Moncton Hawks said Tuesday someone will get seriously injured unless the referees are "cracked down" on high-sticking in Nova Scotia Senior Hockey League games.

McPhee, a Hampton N.E. native who can mix it with the best of them on the ice, made the comment after Moncton's 10-0 loss to league-leading Windsor Maple Leafs Monday night. Moncton's goaler Don Larin was knocked unconscious by a high stick from Windsor player George George Roy, who was handed a major penalty.

"It was a deliberate attempt to injure," said McPhee. "He should have received a match penalty."

The Moncton coach claimed that referees have been "negligent in their duties this year" and it has resulted in several games ending up in wild denouements.

"They're letting things get out of hand," said McPhee. Two other Moncton players, defenceman John Herbert and Gaudette Dey, were clipped for stitches in Monday's game.

Both players were to be in action for Moncton's game tonight at Halifax against second-place Tartans.

Halifax will be without the services of forwards Dave Kiley and Brian Graver who picked up match penalties Monday night in Halifax's 5-4 win over New Glasgow Rangers.

A player receiving a match penalty is suspended until his case is dealt with.
