

Notice of Poll -- School Unit No. 1

To All Persons Qualified to Vote at School Meetings:

Take notice that for the purpose of electing TWO TRUSTEES for School Unit No. 1—ONE TRUSTEE to each Polling Division—a poll will be held on Wednesday, the thirteenth day of June, 1951 from 12 o'clock noon until 9 P.M.

POLLING DIVISION NO. 1 is defined as that portion of School Unit No. 1 which was formerly known as the school districts of Spring Park and Parkdale.

POLLING DIVISION NO. 2 is defined as that part of School Unit No. 1 outside the former school districts of Spring Park and Parkdale.

Nominations of candidates for election to the Board of Trustees shall be filed with the Secretary at any time until 4 o'clock in the afternoon of June 2, 1951. Each nomination paper shall be signed by at least two sponsors who are ratepayers in the area. Every Candidate must be a ratepayer resident in the division and, unless such candidate is a parent ratepayer his nomination paper must be signed by at least one parent ratepayer.

Contract Bridge

"CLOSE" DOESN'T COUNT

Today's declarer came pretty close to victory, but his play lacked the final touch.

North dealer. Neither side vulnerable.

♠ A J 10

♥ A Q 3

♦ Q 10 8

♣ A 5 4 2

♠ K 7 5 4

♥ 2

♦ A 9 8 3

♣ K 9

♠ 5

The bidding:

North East South West

1 N T Pass 4 ♣ Pass

5 ♣ Pass 4 ♠ Pass

Pass Pass 4 ♣ Pass

South's hand was so freakish that conventional bidding methods were virtually useless—he had to bid the slam, or not bid it, on a basis of sheer guesswork. Actually, however, North was on questionable ground when he bid five spades and gave South the problem!

West opened the diamond ace. South ruffed, led to the heart ace and ruffed a second diamond, then went back to the spade ten and ruffed the third diamond. He returned to dummy's spade jack to ruff a heart, and returned with a club to eliminate the heart queen by a ruff.

Now, with the red suits stripped and one trump still in dummy, South led a club. As he had evidently hoped, the defender who

took this trick (West) had no more clubs to lead—but that did South exactly no good, because when West led a heart and gave declarer a ruff-and-discard, he could not put the opportunity to any advantage. There were still two clubs in dummy and two in his own hand, and getting rid of any of them was worthless. South had to accept defeat.

The elaborate stripping process would have paid high dividends if South had made one slight alteration. That was to take the heart finesse—without which he would be helpless. The success of the finesse would have let him discard one club on the heart ace, then strip the red suits and finally throw a defender in with the club. Now West's forced return of a heart or a diamond would let South discard his last club while ruffing in dummy, and the slam would be home.
