The passengers were about retiring at night when a hand ran below and told them to prepare to leave the ship as she would ground in a few minutes. Happily she was backed off, but not until the shore was plainly visible through the fog.

WEDDING BELLS.—The nuptials of Dr. Bearisto and Miss Maggie Pope were celebrated at Summerside this morning. Rev. C. F. Howe performed the ceremony at St. Mary's Church. The church was prettily decorated, and there was a large congregation. Miss Dollie Pope attended the bride, and Mr. W. S. Stewart, of Charlottetown, supported the groom. TO BE DESTROYED.—The liquor seized from Felix Martin recently will be publicly destroyed by the policemen on Market Square, to-morrow, at twelve o'clock. The lot consists of one jar containing two gallons of brandy; one jar containing two quarts of rum; one jar containing three quarts rum; one demijohn containing two gallons brandy; one pint of whiskey; half-pint gin; one gill brandy; half-pint brandy; two bottles gin; one quart rum; half pint brandy; one pint rum—the last mentioned lot being mostly in bottles.

THE CURRIE CASE.—The case of Rev. D. D. Currie vs. The Methodist Conference is now engaging the attention of the New Brunswick Supreme Court. A. A. Stockton and attorney general show cause against an order nisi for certiorari granted by Palm-r, J., Oct. 1887, to bring up the proceedings of the Methodist conference; A. L. Currie, counsel for D. D. Currie, contends that the conference has no jurisdiction to try Currie under the discipline of 1885; that the case had also gone before another tribunal; that only the conference of 1885 could try the matter; that matter is res judicata, as the writ of prohibition does not only charge made by Rev. Mr. Hamilton in 1885, but also any other charge made for the same offence; that only the court constituted by the conference of 1885 could try the case; whether tried pursuant to a then existing or subsequently enacted law, the conference did not proceed according to discipline or general principles of justice; he could not be tried by a discipline he had not seen and could not get.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

The F. C. Baptist Meeting.

BLISSVILLE, N. B., Oct. 17. The evening session of the conference opened at 7.30. Rev. J. A. Gordon, Supt. of the Union Baptist Seminary being present, was accorded a seat in the conference. After some committees had been appointed, the charge against members of the conference for teaching and preaching doctrines not accepted by the F. C. Baptist denominations was taken up. The discussion was entered into by many of the delegates. The ministers charged are Rev. Messrs. G. W. McDonald, Sussex, W. Kingston, Nashwaak; B. Colpitts, Jacksonville; G. B. Trafton, Brown's Flat, K. C.; G. T. Hartley, Upper Woodstock. After a discussion of five hours which was participated in by many of the members both clerical and lay, on the charge preferred against them, for teaching and preaching the doctrine of instantaneous and entire sanctification as a second definite work which the denomination does not believe. The vote was taken and fellowship was withdrawn by a vote of 55 to 6, from the minister aforementioned.

Ottawa News.

OTTAWA, Oct. 17. The Government steamer Stanley, building at Glasgow for winter service between P. E. Island and the Mainland, was successfully launched yesterday. The vessel will probably leave for Canada next month, under the command of Capt. McElhinney. Lord Stanley and suite are at Niagara. The Spanish Consul General at Quebec committed suicide this morning. Cause, business troubles. The Red River Railway was formally opened this morning.

HALIFAX, Oct. 17. The Merchants' Marine Insurance Co. have wound up their business, and transferred \$80,000 of their risks to the Western and Royal Insurance Companies. Rev. Mr. Vroom, of Shediac, has been appointed Professor of Divinity at King's College. The late Matthew Jones leaves all his property, valued at \$150,000, to his widow.

Still on the Rounds.

BARRIE, Ont., Oct. 17. Mrs. Thos. Lennox, wife of a prominent grocer of Barrie, received through the post office to-day a small paper box containing four chocolates similar to those received by the Galt people, which resulted in the death of a child there. The box was handed over to the police. There was nothing to show who sent the box, and the post mark on it could not be made out.

He Can Go.

MONTREAL, Oct. 17. King Tie Cheong, the merchant who has been compelled to ask liberty to go to New York to attend to his business, has been informed that he can go, and that the exclusion of the Chinese intended by the Government refers only to coolies.

To be Wound Up.

MONTREAL, Oct. 17. A motion for an order to wind up the affairs of L'imprimerie Generale has been granted. The total liabilities are in the vicinity of \$30,000, and the company claims assets to the extent of \$40,000.

Yellow Jack.

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Oct. 17. There were 36 new cases to-day and three deaths. The number of cases is increasing, the warm moist weather bringing them out. At South Jacksonville many new cases were reported to-day.
