

CURRENT NOTES.

The North German Gazette, of Berlin, says Germany has no interest whatever in Bulgaria, and that it is not worth while to keep a single German soldier under arms on account of Bulgaria.

Mr. Frederick Vanderbilt is presently to be the owner of the most expensive and beautiful yacht in the world—even the Namouna and the Atlanta yielding the palm to a craft that will cost at least \$460,000.

A couple were riding out in the country, when they passed a barnyard in which were two calves. The young lady observed "O, see those two little cowlets." "You are mistaken," remarked the young man, "they are not cowlets, but bullets."

The arrivals of ocean vessels in Montreal harbor from the opening of navigation up to Tuesday last were 67 more than for the corresponding period last year. The harbor dues for August show an increase of \$18,000 over August, 1885.

According to Bradstreet's, the whole cost of the railroads of the world has been more than \$24,000,000,000, which is about \$24 per inhabitant. In the United States the expenditure has been about \$133 per inhabitant; in Great Britain \$107, and in Canada \$89.

The America of Dickens, and the America of to-day, says a writer in Time, are two widely different countries. It is the difference between the self-conceited, sensitive, half-formed hobbledleddy of sixteen, and the sober, experienced, sensible, full-grown man of thirty.

It is believed that Russia is endeavoring to foment a revolution in Macedonia, and that she will be resisted in her warlike attitude by Austria, Turkey, Roumelia, Bulgaria and Servia. England, it is stated, is ready to assume a leading part. The most trusted men in the English foreign service believe war is inevitable.

An important circular has been received by the Customs officials at Montreal, enjoining them to use greater vigilance in enforcing the laws concerning the coasting trade between Canada and the United States. The circular also states that, there being no treaty with the United States, American vessels must not be allowed to go from one Canadian port to another for cargoes, and orders the officials to take the most stringent measures to enforce these rules.

A Montreal despatch says that some time ago Vian, the notorious burglar, renounced Catholicism, and, on being watched by a warden, whose suspicions were aroused by this strange act, found that the convict only attended the Protestant church to enable him to speak to one of the keepers, with whom he was familiar. Some letters written by Vian to friends outside, were found in the possession of the keeper, who was forthwith discharged, and Vian then renounced Protestantism.

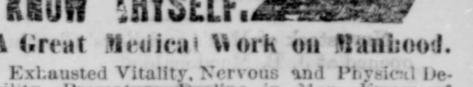

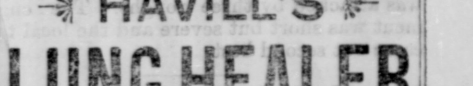

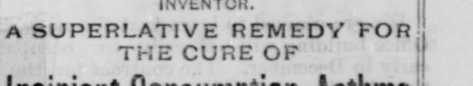
