Famous Red Cherries Make Elegant Cobbler

Through the Straits of Mackinac the Chef and I crossed by ferry to Mackinac Island, site of the oldest military fortification in the United States, and famous for its "Grand Hotel," with the longest verandah in the world.

ICEBOUND IN WINTER

During the winter, the population of the island is only 500 persons, for it is icebound except for airplanes. But come spring, the ice breaks up and comfortable ferry boats convey summer home owners and tourists to the island until its population zooms to 5,000.

But Mackinac Island never loses its serenity and charm; no automobiles there, but coaches and horses, or bicycle chairs to furnish conveyance.

DRIVEN IN STYLE

The big ferry boat had no sooner docked than we were unaged by a lad in colorful uniform and conducted to a landau drawn by a span of horses, the coachman in red uniform, with a shiny top hat and shining black boots. Up the hill to the crowning point "The Grand Hotel," untrussed by plateaus of terraced gardens and overlooking the tops of trees on the plateau. Beyond, a marvelous view of the fabulous Mackinac Bridge and Lakes Michigan and Huron.

Tea was being graciously served from a samovar in the hotel lobby. Dainty sandwiches, delicate cakes and petits fours were passed in elegant tradition of earlier years.

The menu included foods enjoyed "by ladies and gentlemen" throughout the past century. I was especially intrigued with the deliciously intriguing made of Michigan's famous cherries and served in quaint handled dessert dishes that looked for all the world like pressed glass skillets. Measurements are level; recipes for 6.

CHERRY COBBLER Grand Hotel:

Prepare thick canned tart red cherry sauce. Spoon into deep glass dessert dishes. Chill.

Top each with a round of baked French tart or flaky pastry. Garnish with a swirl of whipped cream and a few chopped nuts.

Tart Red Cherry Sauce: Drain contents 2 (1 lb.) cans tart water-pack red pitted cherries. Reserve liquid.

In qt. saucepan stir together 1 c. sugar, 1-16 tsp. salt and 2 tbsp. cornstarch. Gradually stir in cherry liquid.

Cook-stir until boiling over medium heat. Simmer 30 sec.; remove.

Stir in cherries, 1/4 tsp. red food coloring and 1/4 tsp. almond extract.

CHEF'S DUCK OLIVE SAUCE

Pour off liquid from duck roasting pan into a glass jar. Refrigerate 20 min.

Add 1/2 c. hot water to roasting pan. Scrape up brown residue. Remove fat from chilled liquid in jar and add. Bring to a boil; strain.

There should be 1 1/2 c. If short, add enough consommé to make 1 1/2 c.

Next, melt 2 tbsp. butter in small saucepan; stir in 2 tbsp. enriched flour and 2 drops Tabasco. Slowly stir in the duck liquid. Cook-stir until boiling.

Add 1/2 c. sliced stuffed green olives and 1/2 c. sliced canned mushrooms broiled in butter.
