

Saint John Scores 4-3 Win Over Halifax In Weird Sort Of Game

SAINT JOHN, N. B., March 11.—Saint John Beavers pushed Halifax St. Mary's lower into third place of the Maritime Major Hockey League by a 4-3 decision tonight in a fixture referred to by two Halifax goals shot under unusual circumstances, a third period rhuubarb and missile-throwing by irate fans.

The first period ended 3-0 for Saint John after tallies by Jack Meldrum, Al Buchanan and Ron Hurst. Johnny Ubriaco fired the winner in the third. Bob Bonness was credited with two for Halifax, Bill Warwick netting the other.

The two Halifax goals in a 20-second span of the middle period resulted from a strange sequence of odd circumstances. First, Ubriaco broke his stick. While he was getting a new one, Bonness scored. Then, as soon as he returned, Johnny broke the new stick, and before he was back with another replacement Warwick tallied.

Receive Majors

Later in this period, Matt Mesich and Joe McArthur received majors for fighting. McArthur took a beating from the Saint John defence.

After the Urbiaco incidents, and for nearly two minutes while Beavers were two men short, the Saints were unable to get a shot on the Saint John goal. Carl Smelle and Nick Nicolle were serving minors.

Play was held up six minutes or more by a rhuubarb in the last half of the third. Johnny Arundel, Saint John defenceman who was not in tonight's lineup, took a seat on the Beaver bench without his uniform. Referee Frank Elliott ordered him off and Arundel laughed.

The incident resulted in a 10-minute misconduct penalty at 11:28 against the Saint John team, with Doug Hewey, a Saint John Seniors' player who joined the Beaver lineup last Saturday night cleared to do the serving.

Arundel also hopped into the box and was then ordered off the rink. He disappeared into the stands. While Elliott sought a po-

liceman to make sure of Arundel's removal, the irate fans fired peanuts and other articles to the ice. Sweeping work further delayed the game.

Later, one of the 2,300 fans said he had heard someone refer to Elliott as "cabbage head", and presumably the referee thought the remark came from Arundel.

The score was tied at 3-3 early in the third when Nixon's screened shot glanced home off Bonness' stick. Ubriaco's deciding marker was shot at 15:38.

Ubriaco set up Meldrum for the first tally of the night while Halifax played a man short. Buchanan made it 2-0, helped by coach Peanut O'Flaherty, and the first period scoring ended after Hurst and Bill McCracken broke away during a four-man Halifax attack.

For the Islanders last night's game was an excellent opportunity to fatten scoring averages and for the Millionaires it proved to be just a light workout with goalie Cliff Hicks and centreman Frank Bathgate being the only two visiting players showing much effort. The Millionaires showed nothing to justify their 6-0 win over the Glace Bay Miners on the previous night and their apparent strategy is to let the road games go and concentrate on the home contests.

The Millionaires have eight games left in the schedule and are now nine points out of a play-off spot. Tonight they play in Halifax and then they move back to Sydney for two games with the Moncton Hawks. On Saturday night they play the Miners at Glace Bay. If the Millionaires could win those last three games they almost have chances of making the playoffs. It would be considerably brightened. It may be that the Millionaires, as Ronnie Matthews says, are dead on their feet from the 90 game schedule but it is more logical to think that they are holding back for those three games at the end of the week.

At any rate they were an indifferent looking team last night. Their defence was never looser and their forwards never put less effort into a game here. Earlier in the season they took a 10-2 trimming here but that night they looked good in comparison to the most recent exhibition on Charlottetown ice. It was a somewhat sorry and sobering thought to think that these same Millionaires were the best team in the Maritimes last year.

The Millionaires dressed only twelve men and one of them, Lorne Pirie had to retire just after the third period started. Pirie was struck on the eyelid by a stick and two stitches were required to close the gash. Missing from the Mill's line-up was Dunc MacIntyre who has been injured in an arm and who will likely be lost for the rest of the season. Don "Whip" Whelan is also out for the year with a broken wrist.

The Islanders must have established a record for themselves by picking up 38 scoring points. "Buck" Whitlock boosted his assist total for the season to 55 with those five assists. Willie Marshall is second to Jim Anderson of Glace Bay. It is a goal scoring department. Willie has 46 goals for Anderson and those four goals enabled him to jump into fourth position in the point-scoring race. Bob Gray found the going to his liking and piled in four goals. On another occasion he hit the goal post and at least twice more had golden scoring opportunities. Bob has fired 23 goals this year.

The game provided the Islanders with an easy two points which is of importance in the battle for second place. The precarious road trip of the Halifax Saints together with the winning streak of the Islanders has put the club in a favorable position. The Islanders have been unbeaten in their last six games while the Halifax Saints have lost their last four. The last three Halifax losses have been by a one goal margin.

Hanging in the Islanders dressing room these days is a pair of six ounce boxing gloves. The mitts were sent to the Islanders from a group of fans in Halifax who asked that they be made available to all players, especially Phil Vitale. The gloves were sent as a token of gratitude in return for the coal and kindling which a group of Charlottetown fans sent to Halifax coach Wilf Field following the dressing room episode at the Charlottetown Forum. It will also be remembered that Field was presented with a miniature telephone earlier in the season when he was boasting about his ability to use a phone in order to secure players.

Right winger Connie Bonhomme states that he may be back in action on either Saturday of this week or Monday of next. Connie is working out daily and yesterday wore his full dress uniform for the first time since he was injured in Moncton weeks ago. His elbow is still a bit stiff when he straightens it out but it is improving each day. Among those working out with Bonhomme is

Goal Hungry Islanders Boost Scoring Averages Trouncing Mills 14-1

The goal hungry Charlottetown Islanders quenched their hunger at the expense of the Sydney Millionaires last night by crumpling the Moneyman 14-1 in a lopsided game at the Forum before a small crowd of fans.

Bullet Bob Gray and Wee Willie Marshall led the Islanders onslaught by scoring four goals. "Hub" Beaudry and Jim MacKenzie each scored two and defencemen Phil Vitale and Johnny Dutchak rounded out the scoring by shooting single goals.

In all the Islanders collected 38 scoring points with every player except Ray Frederick figuring in the scoring. "Buck" Whitlock and Gray were high men with five points each, followed by Jim MacKenzie, Don Bellringer and Marshall with four.

The scoring feats of the locals were the only redeeming feature of the one-sided contest. The game produced little in the way of excitement as the Millionaires showed next to nothing in the way of offensive power.

The win strengthens the Islanders hold on second place in the league standing. As a result of the Halifax loss to Saint John the Islanders are now three points up on the Saints.

For one or two periods it seemed as though goalie Ray Frederick was on his way to a shutout. In the first two sessions he had kicked out 12 shots, six in each period.

But at the 6:31 mark of the final session left winger Freddy Hildebrand spoiled his bid. Ray kicked a steaming drive by Bill Dinning, but Hildebrand who was parked at the edge of the crease slipped the puck off the pads into the top of the net for the only Sydney marker.

The Islanders went into a 2-0 lead in the first period on goals by Gray and Vitale. At the end of the middle period the score stood 7-0 as the result of goals by both Marshall and MacKenzie and one by Gray.

The shots on goal give some indication of the play but even they don't tell the true facts. In the first period both goalies stopped six shots but the Islanders controlled the play. The locals outshot the visitors 40-11 in the last two periods.

For young Cliff Hicks in the Sydney nets it was a rough night. Even at that Hicks had his good moments, spoiling numerous Islanders bids. After the first period the visitors' defense surrendered and the Islanders swarmed through at will.

The Millionaires made a fight of it for the first few minutes although the hockey was poor to watch. The Moneyman played it defensively with six men back of the red line most of the time but the two goals by Gray and Vitale took them out of their shell. Towards the end of the period they put on an attack but were stopped by Frederick who pulled off nice saves on Pirie and George Robertson.

Lorne Pirie had the first shot on net in the second period and Frederick blocked nicely. Then the Islanders scoring parade started. Jim MacKenzie opened it by knocking in Bob Gray's rebound at the 4:38 mark.

Willie Marshall scored his first goal from close-in at the 9:14 mark after picking up Denis Smith's rebound. Two minutes later Willie climaxed a scramble around the Sydney cage by firing the disc into the rigging.

MacKenzie and Gray found up on the scoring in the period. MacKenzie converted Whitlock's goal mouth pass and Gray took a pass from MacKenzie to rifle a short shot behind Hicks.

Lorne Pirie had to retire at the start of the third period after being struck on the eye lid with a stick. "Hub" Beaudry replaced Walt Pawlyshyn on the left wing and the Islanders' away by firing "Buck" Whitlock's rebound into the cage.

Then the Millionaires struck for their only counter. After that it was Marshall, Gray, Dutchak, Gray, Marshall and Beaudry in that order for the Islanders.

Dutchak's goal was probably the nicest of the lot. The big defenceman circled the net and fired the puck into the twines on the far side.

The Whitlock-Gray-MacKenzie line picked up 14 points between them. The Marshall line scored 11 points and the Trainor line seven.

The Millionaires dressed only 12 players, using three defencemen and eight forwards. Frank Bathgate was the lone forward. Ray Frederick who can handle himself pretty well on a forward line.

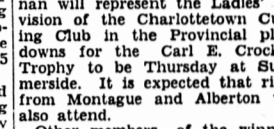
Hudson said the matter will be "completely dealt with" when he receives the referee's written report. Arundel will not play until further notice.

Meanwhile, officials scoured about to obtain ice surface for the Maritimes-Ottawa district series.

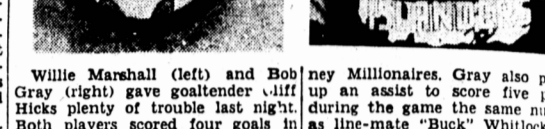
