## 1st Prince Liberals Name Arsenault and Ramsay

ALBERTON — Fred C. Ramsay, M.L.A., and Hon. Prosper Arsenault were named as candidates for the First District of Prince in the forthcoming election at a well attended Liberal nominating convention held last evening in the Alberton Women's Institute Hall.

There were two nominations for councillor. Mr. Ramsay's nomination was moved by Russell Stewart and seconded by Harris Callaghan. Nomination of Robert E. Campbell was moved by Allison MacIntosh and seconded by Joseph Gallant.

Nomination of Hon. Prosper Arsenault for Assemblyman was moved by Lester Wallace and seconded by Hector Richard. There were no other nominations.

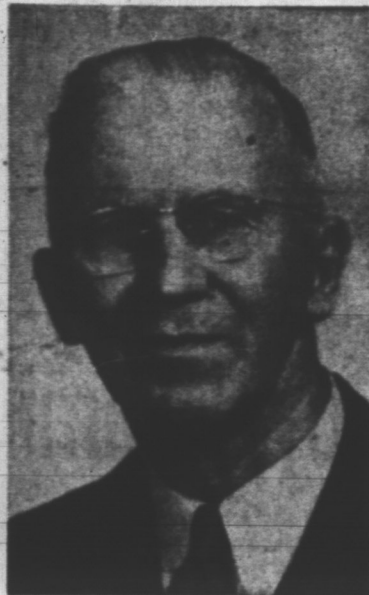
Following voting for councillor, Mr. Campbell asked that Mr. Ramsay's nomination be made unanimous.

Scrutineers were Lester Wallace, Alvin Palmer, Frank Shea and Leigh Weeks.

election. Premier A. W. Matheson, Hon. J. George MacKay, J. Watson MacNaught, and the candidates were called to the platform and addressed the convention. The president recognized the presence of Hon. J.A. Bernard, Hec-

tor Richard, Neil MacLeod and Lester Wallace in the audience. Hon. Prosper Arsenault, the first speaker, expressed the opinion that the Conservative party has nothing to offer that is not already being done. He gave assurance that his own party will work for the people as it has in the past.

## Farming Aids Are Stressed By Minister

One passage in a message from the Hon. Douglas S. Harkness, federal minister of agriculture, appearing on Page 3-B, in the Farm Edition presented as part of today's paper, was dropped out due to a slip in production.

The original message from Mr. Harkness included the following paragraph: "New credit facilities for farm improvement and for farm acquisition were approved at the last session of Parliament and financial assistance to provinces wishing to set up crop insurance schemes was authorized. Extension of credit facilities to veterans on farms was similarly approved. Freight rate assistance and transportation subsidies to Prince Edward Island run into millions of dollars annually."

This passage should have appeared as fifth paragraph of the message from Mr. Harkness, on Page 3-B.

## Coroner's Inquest Adjourned To Oct.

MONTAGUE — The coroner's inquest into the death of Mary Grace MacNeill, who died in a car accident on the night of July 29th, was tentatively adjourned to Friday, October 13th at 8 p.m.

This decision by the coroner, Dr. L.E. Prowse was due to the fact that the occupants of both vehicles were still hospitalized and would be for some time. He was assisted by Ian M. MacLeod, who represented the attorney-general's department.

In the evidence given by Dr. Robert Abel, Assistant provincial pathologist, who performed the autopsy on the body, it was stated that a severe external impact caused extensive internal injuries was the cause of death.
