

LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

A BAD FALL.—A young man named Ward, employed on the farm of B. Hearty, Esq., St. Peter's Road, fell off a load of hay yesterday, while hoisting a forkful into the barn. In falling, he struck on his head and shoulders, and is so severely injured that he will probably be laid up for a week.

POLICE COURT.—At the Police Court, this morning, C. B. Oxley, one of the excursionists from Puzwash, yesterday, was fined \$4 or 10 days. Oxley created quite a disturbance at the Hotel Davies last evening, before he was taken in charge by the police. Two simple drinks were fined each \$2 or ten days. All three paid the fines imposed.

A SUDDEN DEATH.—Mrs. John Coughlan, of Buctouche, who has been sailing for about two years, got up as usual on Sunday morning, July 15th, and did her work around the house. About 10 o'clock she felt unwell and died in a few minutes. Death is supposed to have resulted from a rupture of a blood vessel.

DAMAGE BY FIRE.—We regret to hear that the dwelling house of Mr. Hugh McNeill, of New Village, near Summerside, was burnt to the ground early Monday morning. The house was new and large and Mr. McNeill's loss is very heavy. All his furniture was destroyed, excepting a few articles that were lying about. The children had a narrow escape \$150 in cash was burnt. We hear that the insurance amounted to about \$500. Mr. McNeill has the sympathy of the community in which he lives.

FOUND DEAD.—Mrs. Berrigan, of Lot 40, 30 years of age, was found dead in a field about 400 yards from her home on Saturday last. She was missing for about half a day, and it was thought she had gone to a neighbor's house, as she wandered about from house to house. An inquest was held before Coroner John A. McLaine, of St. Peter's Bay, and a verdict of "found dead" was rendered. Mrs. Berrigan leaves a son, who lived with her, and a daughter married in the States.

NARROWLY ESCAPED DROWNING.—Two brothers, John and Stennis Lapierre, fishermen, of Lot 40, had a narrow escape from drowning on Saturday last. They were out fishing in Peter's harbor, and in jumping from one boat to another one of the boats upset. The clothing of Stennis got caught on the boat and it was with great difficulty he was saved by his brother. He sank several times before being rescued. They were afterwards picked up by others.

THE MARKET.—Owing to having operations at present, to-day's market was not very largely attended. Inside the supply of vegetables, etc., was large, but outside potatoes, hay and oats were scarce. We quote prices as follows: Eggs, 9 to 10c; butter, 18 to 20c; chickens, 35 to 45c per pair; turkeys, 80 to \$1.20 each; strawberries, 16 to 18c; blueberries, 6 to 8c; gooseberries, 6 to 8 cents, and mackerel, 6 to 8 cents. Mr. Alex. McKinnon, of Berrigan, had the first new potatoes of the season on sale. They were of a fairly good size, and were selling at 10c per quart.
