ENGLAND WILL FORTIFY KINGSTON.

Admiralty Will Construct a Dockyard.

AND A LARGE NAVAL DEPOT TO BE ESTABLISHED

In View of the Building of the Nicaraguan Canal.

KINGSTON, Ja., Dec. 8.—Part of the scheme for converting Kingston harbor into a great naval depot and extensive dockyard, in view of the construction of the Nicaragua Canal in the near future, has been made known.

The Admiralty authorities have just completed negotiations for the purchase of a great Pond at the northern extremity of the city, where the proposed dockyard will be constructed.

OTTAWA, Dec 8.—An order in Council has been passed and approved by Lord Minto commuting the death sentence passed upon Elzear Mann, for murder, to imprisonment for life in the penitentiary.

President Hyde Retires.

NEW YORK, Dec 8.—The business career of Henry B Hyde, President of the Equitable Life Assurance Co, is at an end, his health being shattered.

France and Great Britain.

LONDON, Dec 7.—The Paris correspondent of the Daily News says that the negotiations between France and Great Britain are quite hung up, notwithstanding the great accumulation of points in dispute. He ascribes this situation to the sulkiness of the French officials, and refers to a speech made by Admiral Fournier, at Toulon Tuesday, as an unpleasant sign.

Admiral Fournier declared that the French Mediterranean fleet was ready to fight, and was able to await with confidence events that seemed to be shaping themselves. He compared the calm dignity of the French navy in a trying time with the bellicose talk of certain adversaries, indirectly intimating that he meant Great Britain.

The correspondent adds that a draft of the speech was submitted to M. Lockroy, Minister of Marine, before it was delivered, and it was approved.

On the other hand, the Paris correspondent of the Times says that the speech was evidently a post-prandial oration.

Marshal Killed in Tennessee.

LOUISVILLE, Kv., Dec. 8.—A special to the Post from Clarksville, Tenn., says that City Marshal Bryant, of McKenzie, was shot in the head and almost instantly killed while standing in the telegraph office.

The murderer was a boy named Hugh McCall.

McCall fled to his home and committed suicide by taking morphine.

The cause alleged for the murder was that Bryant had arrested McCall last Saturday for drunkenness.

No lives lost.

THE MAD MULLAH.

Advance Temporarily Checked by the Khan of Robat.

LONDON, December 6.—The unpleasant news from the Indian frontier where the "Mad Mullah," is again on the war-path, has caused considerable apprehension among the Indian authorities though the latest advices show that his victorious march has been partly checked by the friendly Khan of Robat, who by a timely move has saved the British lines of communication with the garrison at Chitral, which the Mad Mullah endeavored to cut. The fanatical movement, however, has taken a strong hold among the Swatis, and there is a prospect of another "little frontier war." A British force of nearly seven thousand men is now held in readiness for movement to the front. The followers of the Mullah are variously estimated to number from three thousand to six thousand and their numbers are growing daily. The outcome of the rising will probably be an effective British occupation of the whole of the Swat Valley and another big hole in the Indian budget.

A Proposition.

TORONTO, Dec 7.—The Toronto Globe's special cable from London says: The Brit Chamber of Commerce is urging the appointment of a Canadian agent to reside permanently at that port. In addition, Bristol will probably send a commercial deputation to Canada next spring.

France and the States.

PARIS, Dec 7.—The Journal Des Debats welcomes President McKinley's hope that a Franco-American understanding will shortly be reached. "As evidence of the friendship which was doubtless promoted by the important role recently enacted by the French ambassador at Washington," it adds: "Not a power interested in the far east is disposed to deny America the practical and reasonable demand of President McKinley."

The Temps thinks, after perusing the message, no one will be the wiser in regard to what can be hoped from the friendship of the United States offered from her enterprises.

"As regards Cuba, it may be remarked that the President's declaration is absolutely identical with the declaration of Great Britain when that country entered Egypt, and where she still remains."

The most interesting point of the message, according to the Journal Des Debats, is the fact that Great Britain's warm words of fraternalization are not loudly echoed in it."

BRITAIN'S ATTITUDE

Sir Edmund Monson Speaks Out Pretty Plainly in Paris

PARIS, Dec 6.—At the silver jubilee banquet of the British Chamber of Commerce here, this evening, the British ambassador, Sir Edmund J. Monson, referring to the "new diplomacy" which is said to have come into fashion during the past year, said it was chiefly due to the enterprise of the press, but also it was in a measure due to "mother country inventions and to the originality of the American mind, ever restlessly watching to improve everything which will perhaps end by improving the diplomatism of the old school of the face of the earth."

Sir Edmund Monson then proceeded to dilate on the recent remarkable outburst of public feeling in Great Britain, provoked by the Fashoda incident, and said he ventured to express the hope that the idea of Great Britain being unduly squeezeable and prone to make graceful but impolite concessions is thoroughly exploded.

NEWS NOTES.

The bill now before congress for the government of the Hawaiian Islands will probably be considerably modified before it passes. Among its most objectionable provisions is one restricting the franchise within the same limits as those marked by the bogus government which has just gone out of existence.

Arrivals from Skagway tell of an active volcano about fifty miles from the Adlin mining district. So far it has been intermittent in its activity and the sight has been witnessed but by a few people. No name has as yet been given to the mountain, but the officials at Adlin are reported to be preparing to take a trip of inspection to the site in a short time. They will have scientific instruments along and will be able to take notes which will undoubtedly prove of much interest and value to science.
