AN explosion which might have been attended by serious results occurred in the office of Drs. Bagnall and Robins yesterday. The vulcanizer which is heated by lamps increased its steam quicker than usual, and while both Doctors were absent from the work room, and at work in their respective offices, it exploded, breaking the lamps, bursting a hole in the ceiling and filling the apartment with steam. Fortunately no great damage was done.

THE barque "Gulnare," Capt. William McDonald, owned by Hon. L. C. Owen, on passage from Little Grace Bay to Havana, with a cargo of coal, arrived in Cariboo Cove on Tuesday. Captain McDonald reports that his ship struck on the bar when leaving Little Grace Bay, and on Friday he experienced a heavy gale, during which the vessel shipped a heavy sea which carried off and drowned the mate and one man. The sea also carried away the wheel, binnacle, and did other damage to the vessel.

THE SCOTT ACT PETITION.—The Pioneer says the list of names on the petition for repeal of the Scott Act in Prince County has been published by the Temperance Alliance here. The total is 1,260, some of which appear twice, and a very large proportion are "his-mark" signatures. Mr. Robert Hardy collected 937 names, and of these 327 (over) are signed by an X. This showing is we hope not a fair criterion of the literary status of our province. The extraordinary proportion of mark names may be accounted for by the nature of the petition. If the prayer of the petition be granted, we hope that voters will consider what they do before casting their ballots.

NEW ZEALAND some years ago undertook the construction of a system of railways as a government work. Money was borrowed to the amount of eleven million sterling, and 1,355 miles of railway constructed, on which passengers and freight are carried at moderate charges. It is officially stated that these roads pay a profit of £400,000 per annum above the charges for working expenses and maintenance or nearly 4 per cent. on the capital invested. The New Zealanders have thus incurred a great national debt, but as we owe nothing indirectly on their railroads, the way of bonds, and as the earnings of the roads are little over

Liquor License.

TORONTO, Nov. 20. At a meeting of the Welland County Licensed Victuallers Association yesterday, it was resolved that the Dominion Liquor License Act, on account of indefiniteness of its clauses, and many restrictions of its sections hampered respectable dealers engaged in legitimate trade, and tends to cause a loss of property by promoting litigation without any corresponding benefit accruing to the temperance people, the Association should entirely ignore it, and accept license under the Provincial or Crooks Act, as best calculated to give equal rights and privileges to all classes of the community.

The Irish Secret Society.

LONDON, Nov. 20. The Standard publishes a lengthy letter from a correspondent, whose good faith it states to be beyond question, who professes to be a member of an American Irish Secret Society, and who says: "It is a cruel tyranny. Once the oath is taken a member surrenders his liberty and spies attend his every step." He goes on to tell there are 228 men now under him getting \$13 a week. These men get their orders from the head of the society and no one knows the others business. He says a greater movement is now on foot than ever before attempted.

Hooting Priests.

ROME, Nov. 20. Yesterday, while the Communal Council was discussing a motion in favor of entrusting the priest with religious instructions in municipal schools, a crowd burst into the room and commenced whistling and hooting. The greatest disorder prevailed, but the hall was finally cleared and the discussion resumed with closed doors. Several arrests were made.

O'Donnell a Molly Maguire.

ROCHESTER, N. Y. Nov. 20. O'Donnell, the murderer of Carey, is known to have been one of the chiefs of the Molly Maguires, who all seem to have met their fate before him.

Poole's Confession.

DUBLIN, Nov. 20. Poole, who has been sentenced to death for murdering Kenny, addressed the court as follows: "I did not kill Kenny, I am one of the Fenian brotherhood and am prepared to die. Farewell all, Farewell Ireland! Three cheers for the Irish Republic! To Hell with English Tyranny!"

Extradition.

BUGHAREST, Nov. 20. An extradition treaty which has been concluded between Roumania and Monaco recognizes attempts upon the lives of sovereigns as common law offences, and provides that the assassins shall be extradited in the usual manner.

Wreck of an Unknown Ship.

NORTH SYDNEY, Nov. 20. The operator at Meat Cove reports that the only clue to the identity of the lost ship there is a plank marked "Miramichi" and five letters of a name which read "NORIL." He saw two dead bodies but could not secure them.

John Chinaman.

TORONTO, Nov. 20. A Chinaman who landed from a steamer at Victoria, B. C., on Saturday, was found to have a carpet bag full of dynamite cartridges. He is believed to be a Fenian in disguise.

Protecting the Queen.

LONDON, Nov. 20. Great precautions were taken for the safety of the train that conveyed Queen Victoria from Balmoral to Windsor to-day. Large gangs of men guarded the railway.

A Protest.

OTTAWA, Nov. 20. The Archbishop of Toronto has issued a protest against the cost of maintenance of destitute Irish immigrants being thrown on Catholic society.

Broke his Neck.

FREDERICTON, N. B. Nov. 20. Mr. Edward O'Neill fell down the stairs of Jones' boarding house last night and broke his neck. When picked up he was dead.

A British Garrison for Egypt.

LONDON, Nov. 20. The Times says a substantial British garrison will be kept in Egypt, and is essential to the interests of civilization.

Eighteen Men Drowned.

PARIS, Nov. 20. Eighteen workmen were drowned yesterday while crossing the river at Donarneriez.

A Printing Office Seized.

VIENNA, Nov. 20. The police have seized the secret printing office from which Socialist pamphlets have been issuing.
