ANOTHER CENTENARIAN.—Centenarians are becoming very common nowadays. On Wednesday next Mrs. Amy Blizard, of McDonald's Point, Queen's County, N. B., will celebrate her 107th birthday. Her relatives are planning a big celebration in honor of the event.

TENNIS TOURNAMENT.—Will the gentlemen of the Charlottetown Lawn Tennis Club kindly take notice that there will be a tournament at the park on Saturday afternoon at three o'clock, consisting of men's doubles. Mrs. Alexander Brown has very kindly offered a prize.

MORE CHEESE.—A Petitcodiac correspondent of the Moncton Times says: The cheese factory has enjoyed a prosperous season thus far. The last shipment consisted of 216 cheese and was sold to Mr. T. J. Dillon, of Charlottetown, who indeed takes the entire output for exportation to England. The prevailing price is 8 1-8c, which is considered good.

OPERA HOUSE.—The Zooscope reproduction of the world-famous Passion Play as performed each year by the peasants of Mount Horritz, did not attract a large audience to the Opera House last evening. But the performance was very interesting and instructive. Each picture was briefly introduced by the lecturer of the company. The pictures were very good, but their flickering was somewhat severe on the eyes.

AGAIN TO THE FRONT.—Colonel Irving of Halifax, who was for several years President of the Caledonian Club of this province, has still a warm place for that organization. This year he showed his kindness by presenting a medal to the best step-dancer, which prize was awarded to Miss Belle Paton, daughter of Mr. James Paton, Charlottetown. The medal has not yet arrived, but it will no doubt be a handsome one.

A BAD ACCIDENT.—A farmer named Thomas Riley, living near Hampton N. B., met with a bad accident a few days ago. He was mowing on a side hill, when the wheel of the mower dropped into a depression, bringing the machine almost to a standstill. It is supposed the cutters were clogged. He gave the horse a smart cut with the whip, the horse gave a jump, unseating the driver, who put his foot into the wheel, suffering a compound fracture of the leg. The ankle was shattered and the flesh much lacerated.

BANK MYSTERY SOLVED.—The mystery of the robbery of \$92,000 from Molson's bank at Winnipeg between September 28 and October 4 has last been solved. John W. Anderson, former junior clerk in the bank, is now in goal charged with the crime. The money has been recovered and is now in safe custody. The mystery was solved by P. Davis, who claims to be connected with a private detective agency in Chicago. Davis secured Anderson's friendship and through this succeeded in working from him an admission of his guilt. The stolen money was found buried in the ground just outside the city. Anderson comes from Hastings, Ont., and is about 22 years old. By his clever work Davis gets a reward of ten thousand dollars offered for the recovery of the stolen money.
