A MELANCHOLY accident occurred Thursday night last, in Hamilton, Ont. James Allen and his son, John, lay in the front room, both suffering from injuries received recently, the former at the Grand Trunk Railway Works, the latter at the Ontario Cotton Mills. Thursday evening the mother, it is supposed, turned the stop-dampener of a self-feeding stove in the room, and on Friday morning when the room was opened, it was found that the son, aged about 15 and the mother were dead, and Mr. Allen's life was nearly extinct; the latter is still alive but unconscious. Doctors entertain hopes of his final recovery. The case is a very sad one. There were five in the family, from 3 years of age up to 15. Four young children, sleeping up stairs escaped.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

King's County Election Case.

OTTAWA, March 22.

The examination of Dr. Robertson was continued by the Committee on Privileges and Elections, yesterday. He testified that he could not remember handing the returning officer a statement of his property qualifications. He also swore that he resigned as a member of the Local Legislature on the 13th of June, 1882, and not on the 12th as before stated.

The Bank Amalgamation.

The Bill for amalgamating the Union Bank of P. E. Island with the Bank of Nova Scotia, passed the Committee yesterday.

The Accident to Her Majesty.

LONDON, March 22.

Great excitement exists here on account of the condition of Her Majesty the Queen. The accident which she met with at Windsor on Monday shook her severely and injured her knee. She drove out afterwards and took ill in the carriage. She is now confined to the Castle.

A bulletin issued at 3 o'clock, p. m., stated that Her Majesty's condition is now past immediate danger.

Western Items.

Reuben Tuplin, Esq., we are sorry to say, is ill again.

Our old friend, F. R. Morrison, Esq., of the Bank of Nova Scotia, is spending a day or two in town.

Mr. James H. Cole, merchant at Tyne Valley, has taken his brother, Douglas Cole, into partnership with him.

John McKenzie, Esq., we are glad to say, has so far recovered as to be able to attend to business again.

We are pleased to learn that Thomas Crabbe, Esq., is rapidly recovering from his late severe illness.

Mr. Edward Warren of Burlington has a stall-fed steer only three years old which is estimated to weigh 1,600 pounds.

Large quantities of mussel-mud have been shipped from this Station for different points along the railway between here and Charlottetown.

Harrington & McNeill, blacksmiths, will shortly commence the building of a new shop nearly opposite the store of Anderson & Burrows.

As Mr. C. A. McNutt has gone into business at Kensington, he has decided to sell his famous horse, "Bosh Messenger." The purchaser, whoever he may be, will get a good stock animal.

The election to fill the vacancy in the Town Council, caused by the resignation of W. T. Burrows, Esq., came off on Monday last. At the close of the poll the vote stood: Farrow, 184, and Compton, 175, a difference in favor of Mr. Farrow of nine.

Rev. Dr. McDonald's lecture, on Tuesday evening next, in Ludlow Hall, will, no doubt be a rare treat, as he was highly spoken of by the press. The rev. gentleman makes his lectures very interesting and attractive, by illustrating any particular part which he wishes to bring prominently before his audience, with appropriate songs, composed by Ireland's most gifted poet, Tom Moore.

The lottery of the building on the corner of Summer and Church Streets, has been postponed until the 2nd day of July next. The lot immediately south of above property is the one lately chosen by the Government for the new Post Office site, which has no doubt greatly enhanced the value of the property to be disposed of by lottery, and which should materially increase the sale of tickets.

The trot on Saturday last on the ice here, which was in splendid condition, was by no means an exciting one, as it seemed to be too much one-sided, notwithstanding there was a very large number of spectators. The race was between Mr. T. B. Grady's "Fairy Queen" and Mr. H. Craswell's "Harry Messenger," for \$20 a side. From the start it was quite evident that "Harry Messenger" was no match for his opponent, as the old "Fairy Queen" won the race easily in two straight heats, almost making a distance of it the second time. The time was something over three minutes and not as reported in one of the Charlottetown papers. The old "Queen" in her best days could not come any where near the time quoted by our Charlottetown contemporary.

The entertainment in Ludlow Hall on Saturday evening last, by the members of St. Paul's Church Choir, assisted by a few friends, was largely attended by a very appreciative audience. We were unable to be present during the entire evening, but such parts as we had the pleasure of listening to were very good. "Erin's Native Shamrock," and other choruses by the Choir, met with hearty applause. Miss Katie Doyle's instrumental piece, "The Harp of Tara," was well rendered. The "Irish Emigrants," a duet by Mr. A. A. McLellan and Miss Dewsey, was also very good. Mr. F. W. Clarke's songs from old Ditcher land were loudly applauded. "Rory O'More," as sung by Mrs. Dr. Gillis, met with prolonged applause. Of course Professor Easty's part of the programme was appreciated. Miss Fitzpatrick sang "Erin, Home of my Childhood," very sweetly. Miss Wickham and Mr. P. Gillis' chorus was evidently very satisfactory. Mr. Morris' song elicited considerable applause. Miss Gaudet's performance on the piano showed considerable talent. Tableaux of Canada, Ireland, etc., were very well produced, and judging from the many complimentary remarks we have heard the entire concert was in every way satisfactory to those who had the pleasure of attending.
