Study Clubs Favored By Bishop O'Sullivan

A speaker at a meeting held in Holy Redeemer Parish Hall last night for the purpose of studying credit union systems, Bishop J. A. O'Sullivan urged that people "think for themselves."

Bishop O'Sullivan said he was in favor of the organization of study clubs which provided the average citizen with an opportunity of looking into and reaching a solution to his own problems.

Establishment of credit unions, the Bishop said, would enable the average person to handle his own finances and deal with his economic problems.

Sponsored by Holy Redeemer Holy Name Society Study Group, the meeting featured a panel discussion of credit union plans by members of the parish clubs. It was principally to acquaint Charlotte-town's woman population with the working of credit unions.

Members of the panel were: Dr. J. Crozier, J. J. Leightner, J. F. A. Arsenault, Benjamin Gallant, Pius Callaghan, Roney Gallant, Roderick MacDonald, James Coyle, Jr., and P. J. Rossier, who presided.

A large number of women attended the meeting.

Very Rev. H. I. Fleming, C.S.S.R., Spiritual Director of the Holy Name Society, was present and spoke briefly.

Trinity United Church New Organ Used At St. Paul's Church Sunday

Services at St. Paul's Church yesterday, both morning and evening, when the new Casavant pipe organ was used for the first time were very largely attended.

The new instrument proved to be distinctly up to expectations, and the music at both services was of a high order. In addition to the ordinary hymns which go with Palm Sunday the choir rendered very excellently at both morning and evening services Mozart's beautiful anthem, "I Will Give Thanks Unto the Lord." The choir under Mr. Shephard's leadership has been showing steady progress and no doubt with the fine new instrument for accompaniment will render excellent music.

In the evening Mr. Shephard was at the organ from 6.30 until the beginning of the evening service at 7 o'clock.

At the morning service the recitor, Rev. H. D. Raymond, spoke from the opening words of the 95th Psalm, "O come let us sing unto the Lord."

During his sermon he outlined briefly the steps which had led to the procuring of the new organ. In 1926 the ladies of the congregation began to accumulate the nucleus of an organ fund and in 1929 specifications were obtained from Casavant Bros., St. Hyacinthe, P. Q., one of the largest firms of organ builders on the continent. It was hoped that the project might then have been carried out but it proved at that time to be not feasible. In the fall of 1935, however, it was found that the project could be carried out and as a result an order was placed last October. The completed organ was handed over to the officers of St. Paul's Church last week.

In the course of his sermon the Rector pointed out that the use of an up-to-date instrument is by no means to take the place of the human element in the service. The text said, "O come let us sing," not "O come let us listen."

Referring to the element of harmony which has so large a place in music the speaker stressed the necessity of harmony within a church and congregation and expressed his thankfulness that such was to be found within the congregation of St. Paul's. He urged the necessity of reality in music used in religious services stressing that the singer should always enter into the truth which the words and music express.

In his sermon at the evening service the Rector recalled the events of the first Palm Sunday with the Saviour's triumphant entry into Jerusalem. He emphasized the message of the meek and lowly Jesus, as the King triumphant, whose offering was to take away the sin of the world.

On Good Friday evening the choir under the direction of Mr. H. R. Shephard will render Sir John Stainer's "Crucifixion."

RELIGIOUS SERVICES

THE BAPTIST CHURCH

The Rev. F. E. Bishop, whose outstanding sermons have engaged the attention of so many listeners during his stay with this Church, delivered two notable addresses yesterday, at the morning service speaking on "The Kingdom of God," and at the evening on "Three Great Words."

The Communion was observed at the evening service.

Mr. V. L. Dingwell, at the morning service sang effectively Fauer's "The Palms." The anthem of the evening was "They that trust in the Lord" with duet by Miss Davida Baker and Miss Pearl Burns.

It was intimated that on each evening except Saturday, during the present week there will be special services addressed by Mr. Bishop. A cordial invitation is extended to all.

ST. JAMES' KIRK

The Holy Communion was celebrated at St. James' Presbyterian Church yesterday morning. A large congregation were in attendance to participate in the Sacramental Banquet.

The Minister, the Rev. Dr. R. Moorhead Legate, in addressing the table, drew attention to the words of our Lord, "Man shall not live by bread alone, but by every word which proceedeth from the mouth of God." Dr. Legate stressed the importance of making a study of the Word of God, by reading the Bible.

We should read the Holy Word as we would read the cherished letters of a long lost friend. The studied reading of the Bible will bring us to feel nearer to God, and it should be read day by day, as we partake of our daily bread.

At the evening service, the Minister used two texts to bring out the thought of the sermon and to show the contrast recorded.

"Behold thy King coming unto thee, meek and sitting upon an ass," St. Matthew XXI verse 5, and "And behold a white horse, and he that sat on him was called Faithful and True." And on his head were many crowns," Revelation XIX, verse 11.

The first pictures the Lord entering the royal city as King, where within a week He was to be crowned not with a crown of gold, but one of thorns. No doubt many followers of Jesus who were awaiting his entry to the city, were disappointed when they beheld his humble state, riding upon an ass, the emblem of poverty.

Many there are today who are ashamed of the humility of Christ. Yet there were those there who cast their cloaks in the dust as a carpet of honor to the King of Kings.

In the revelation of John, the King of Kings is pictured as having white horse which denotes the Conqueror and riding in the state typifying his power. Here John sees Him wearing not one crown, but many crowns indicating His universal kingship. Let us lay in the dust our proud whims, and recognize in Him the King of Kings and Lord of Lords, as did those who looked upon the humble procession of the text.

A beautiful solo rendition of "There is a green hill far away," Gounod, was contributed by Mrs. J. A. Lawson.

Palm Sunday was duly observed at St. Dunstan's Basilica yesterday. At all the masses a large number received Holy Communion. Rev. Dr. McMahon preached at all the masses.

After the blessing of the palm, Solemn High Mass was celebrated by Rev. Dr. Monaghan, assisted by Rev. Father McCordie as deacon and Rev. Father Dalton as sub-deacon.

In the evening at 7 o'clock Rev. Thomas McMahon, C.S.P., preached another in his series of Lenten sermons. He took as the subject of his discourse "Temptation." Flotilla Of Five Ships To Carry Visiting Pilgrims

(C.P. By Guardian's Special Wire)

OTTAWA, April 5—A flotilla of five ships will convey close to 6,000 pilgrims to Vimy Ridge in July for the unveiling of Canada's national memorial there. In a consultation between Brig. General Alex Rees, Dominion president of the Canadian Legion, and representatives of the Canadian Pacific and White Star-Cunard steamship companies, the decision was reached yesterday to augment the formerly arranged four liners by an additional one.

The capacity of the "troopships" is 5,950. Already 6,400 persons have indicated their intention of making the journey, but the expectation is that before the date of embarkation quite a number will "drop out."

General Rees said here today that the 5,950 was the "absolute limit."

The Legion head announced today that Col. D. E. McIntyre, D.S.O., M.C., of Owen Sound, has been placed in charge of "pilgrimage movement."

"Nice Progress"

CHICAGO, April 5.—"Nice progress" in a secret search for an alleged \$5,000 cache of "Lindbergh ransom" money in New York was reported today by attorney Bernard M. Finnigan in a telegram to his wife, Finnigan's client, Stephen Spitz, claimed to have bought \$5,000 of the money and hidden it.

The wire was sent after the electrocution of Bruno Richard Hauptmann, and indicated his death would not change her husband's plans, the woman said.

It was an \$892 telegraph money order from Governor Hoffman of New Jersey that freed Spitz from prison here on a forgery charge early Wednesday after Spitz had offered to uncover the "ransom" cache in New York, Mrs. Finnigan said. The money paid the remainder of a \$1,000 fine.

Would Boycott Nazi-made Goods

(C.P. By Guardian's Special Wire)

PITTSBURGH, April 5—The executive board of District Five, United Mine Workers of America, asked its 400,000 members today to enforce a boycott on all German made goods.

P. T. Fagan, district president, said:

"Nazi Germany today is the greatest enemy of labor and humanity. It destroyed the powerful German labor movement; abolished democracy, freedom of speech, press and assembly; ruined Liberals, Catholics, Protestants and Jews; established armies of forced labor, bloody concentration camps and brown houses of torture worse than in the dark days of Siberia."
