School Parade Semi-Finals Winners Decided

Winners of 1st and 2nd place honors in the Schurmans School Parade semi-finals held on Friday afternoon at the Summerside High School will enter the finals next May.

Over 100 students competed in the semi-finals and they with their teachers and parents were supper guests of the M. F. Schurman Co. Ltd., at Robsons Restaurant on Friday afternoon. They were entertained after eating by the showing of the film "Royal Journey."

The firm of M. F. Schurman is to be commended for this public service feature whereby hundreds of school children are given the opportunity to competitively develop their ability in reading, speaking, singing, and piano playing every Friday evening in a full hour's program. A part of the program during the fall series featured a general information quiz between schools in two divisions, namely, schools having 1 to 3 classrooms, and schools having 4 or more classrooms.

Toronto Man Awarded Stalin Peace Prize

MOSCOW, Dec. 21 — (CP) — Dr. James Endicott of Toronto today was named a winner of the Stalin peace prize for the "strengthening of peace between peoples"

Endicott, head of the leftist Canadian Peace Congress, was one of seven winners, each from a different country, who received the 100,000-ruble awards on Prime Minister Stalin's 73rd birthday.

(At arbitrary Russian rates which set the value of the ruble at 25 cents, the award would be worth \$25,000. Actually, however, the ruble is valued at much less in world currency exchange.)
