

ment they quitted the mouth of the mortar; to the manifest danger of those around it; and although some of them were finally projected into the citadel, and made, as we are told, great holes, the holes do not seem to have been opened in those places against which the shot was directed. We shall probably learn more of its effects when we are in possession of the narrative of the garrison, who are said to have danced for joy when Chasse consented to capitulate.

*Capitulation concluded between General Baron Chasse, Commandant of the Citadel of Antwerp and the Forts depending on it, and Marshal Count Gerard, Commander-in-Chief of the French Army before that Fortress*

"Art. 1. The General of Infantry, Baron Chasse, shall deliver up to Marshal Count Gerard the citadel of Antwerp, the position of the Tete de Flandres, the Forts Burght, Zwyndrecht, and Austrewel in their present state, with the artillery, ammunition, and provisions, except those objects mentioned in article 3.

"Art. 2. The garrison shall march out with the honors of war, lay down their arms upon the glacis, and be prisoners of war. However, Marshal Gerard engages to have them conducted back to the frontiers of Holland, where their arms shall be restored to them as soon as the King of Holland shall have ordered the delivery up of Forts Lillo and Liefkenshoek. With this view Marshal Gerard will send, without delay, an officer to the Hague, and permit General Chasse to despatch one on his part, if he should think proper.

"Art. 3. The officers shall keep their arms. All the garrison shall keep their baggage, carriages, horses, and effects, belonging either to the troops or to the individuals of the garrison. The persons unconnected with the garrison who have remained in the citadel shall be under the protection of the French army.

"Art. 4. If the answer from the Hague should order the delivery up of Forts Lillo and Liefkenshoek, the garrison shall be conducted back to the frontiers of Holland, either by water or by land, at the option of General Chasse, immediately after the said forts have been taken possession of.

"Art. 5. If the garrison are to go by land; they shall march in one column. General Chasse shall be at liberty to send off staff officers and commissaries to prepare lodgings upon the Dutch territory.

"Art. 6. In case the horses and carriages belonging to the garrison should not suffice for the transport of their effects, means shall be provided for the conveyance at the expense of the garrison. It shall be the same with regard to the boats that may be required for the removal of the furniture of the officers and others attached to the garrison,

"Art. 7. For the removal of the sick and

wounded the necessary boats shall be furnished at the expense of the Dutch Government, to send them to Bergen-op-Zoom. Such of the sick as are not in a state to be removed shall continue to receive treatment in places suited to their situation at the expense of the Dutch Government, from surgeons of that nation who shall enjoy, on their leaving, the same advantages as the garrison.

"Art. 8. Immediately after the signatures of the present capitulation the besieging army shall occupy with one battalion the half-moon and curtain-gate in front of the town.

"Art. 9. The commandants of the artillery and the engineer corps shall, within the shortest space of time possible, give up to the commandants of the same corps of the French army, the arms, ammunition, plans, &c belonging to the branches of the service with which they are severally charged. An inventory shall be drawn up on both sides of the objects delivered up. Given at head-quarters under Antwerp, Dec 23.

"The Lieutenant General, Chief of the Staff, furnished with powers by the Marshal Commander-in-Chief of the army of the North.
