AN ENGLISH OPINION

On How to Rear and Feed Pigs

In a lecture on "How to rear and feed pigs," delivered at Cambridge, C. B. for the County Council, Mr Sanders Spencer, the well known pig-breeder, in the first place said that, although there was some difference of opinion as to the desirability of having any one in attendance upon a sow at the time of farrowing, his own practice was to provide such attendance. Many young pigs were thus saved, he said, especially in cold weather. The number of pigs which a sow should be allowed to rear, he proceeded to remark, depended on circumstances. A sow in the vigour of life might bring up eleven in a summer and a yelt (or young sow) or an aged one eight. These number they would bring up with less strain in summer than they would rear nine or six respectively in winter. In rearing pigs for show, however, he would not have more than seven or eight pigs on a mature sow, or five on a yelt or an aged sow. It was seldom possible, however, to get pigs from a yelt or an aged sow to compete with those of a second or third litter. In feeding a brood sow, Mr Spencer stated, but little care was needed until she had gone three fourths of her time, after which the food should be gradually increased in quality, not being to bulky. He preferred to feed on what is known as hog's meal, with a little coarse bran added, after the farrowing for at least a month. Later on when the sow was turned out for a run for a half an hour, wheat was thrown down in the sty, some of which the young pigs would pick up, while the sow would get the rest on her return. The time of allowing the sow to be away from her pigs might be gradually extended, and the wheat or oats thrown to the young pig gradually increased, until the sow ceased to desire to return to the pigs, and they did not take much notice of her. Mr Spencer prefers this gradual plan of weaning to a sudden one.—Leeds G. B. Mercury.

Profit in Keeping Hens.

It is considered that 75 cents is a fair estimate for keeping a hen on a farm for one year. This estimate does not allow for kitchen waste, etc., which may be of little value when not fed to the hens. When everything has to be purchased it is estimated that the average size hen will consume from \$1 to \$1.50 worth of grain and supplies in a year. Some farm poultry growers in the United States reckon the cost of feeding them during the winter, and does not place any value on summer feeding in the fields. The estimate recorded is 25 cents per year, but this must apply to countries where there are summer conditions all the year round. If \$1 per year be taken as a fair average for keeping a hen a year, what profit is there in the business for the poultry raiser? This will depend, largely, upon the kind of fowls, and how they are cared for and fed. It is stated that an experienced poultry raiser of New York State, by selecting the best layers among his flock of Leghorns for several years, got his whole flock of 600 up to an average of 196 eggs per hen per year. This is an extremely high average for so many hens on one farm, and is not to be expected that ordinary fowls will do as well. At the current price for fresh eggs each of these fowls would return its owner about \$3 a year for eggs. But even if we cut the number down to 100 eggs for each hen per year, there is money in the business for the farmer if he looks after it properly.—Farming.

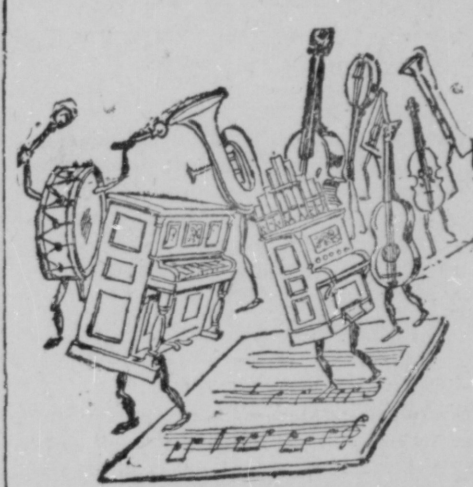
