CONTRACT BRIDGE

TEST YOUR PLAY

1. You are declarer with the West hand at Sp Clubs. North leads the five of spades and you win the ten with the ace. South is playing the two of hearts. How would you play the hand?
2. You are declarer with the West hand at Three Trump. North leads the jack of hearts. How would you play the hand?
3. Draw the outstanding trump and then lead a low diamond and depress the nine of North play low. If the nine wins the trick or loses to the king, you have to lead the ace, but even if the nine loses to the jack, the contract is certain. You started with the ace and sure tricks and South must now give you an additional trick, but the value of what he returns. He is employed in all suits.
4. If, when you lead the low diamond, North trumps or leads the ace, you win with the ace. You then concede a diamond trick to assure the contract.
5. You can't be sure of the outcome of this hand, but there is only one correct way to play it. Win the heart with the ace and return a club. If South goes up with the ace, you must now lead normally, that is, 5-3 or 4-2. But let's suppose South 4-2.

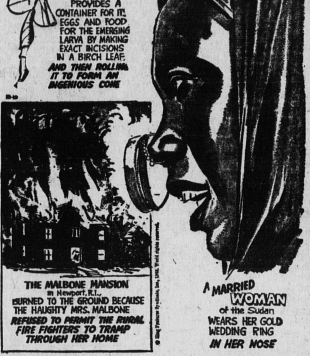
