THAT POISONED CANDY.

Some Important Testimony.

The Case Against McDonald.

ST. JOHN, N. B., Oct. 9. The inquest on the death of Mrs. MacLae was not adjourned until midnight to-night. The court room was densely packed with people, the number of prominent citizens present being particularly noticeable. Three important witnesses were examined, namely, T. B. Barker, head of the firm of T. B. Barker & Sons, H. W. Barker, of the firm, and Gerow, their book-keeper, all of whom testified unhesitatingly to the sanity of Wm. McDonald. The evidence of H. W. Barker and Gerow, taken together, unquestionably justified the arrest of McDonald. Through these witnesses it was learned that the prisoner had a duplicate key, and had access to the wholesale department at all hours, and that such key he got made for his own use, having borrowed a key for the purpose from a fellow clerk. The boxes in which the poisoned candy was sent, were produced in court, and H. W. Barker, recognized in them boxes in all respects similar to those in the firm's wholesale department containing Steward three-inch fine combs. It also came out that three broken packages of strychnine were found by Detective Ring. One of them was turned wrong end in on the shelf as if placed that way to escape notice. The evidence is being taken down by a short-hand reporter. Every one who heard the testimony was of the opinion that the Crown has a strong chain of evidence.

Big Railway Scheme.

MILWAUKEE, Oct. 9. A private letter from Principal Colby, of the Wisconsin Central Railway, to the stockholders of the Northern Pacific system, reveals a gigantic railway consolidation scheme that will connect two oceans and revolutionize international railway traffic. It was never intended that the letter should become public, as it contains the inside workings of the great scheme which is not yet entirely completed. The consolidation of the Wisconsin Central and Northern Pacific systems is the first step. The Atchison road is also in the deal reaching Mexico and Southern California. Chicago will be the centre for operating the three great lines. The Northern Pacific will be extended to Puget Sound and be built into Alaska, making a continuous line from New York City to Sitka.

Assessment Insurance Certificates.

OTTAWA, Oct. 9. The Minister of Justice has decided that the certificates issued by the Dominion Government to assessment insurance companies incorporated by provincial acts authorizing companies to do business in Canada are invalid, on the ground that such companies or societies must be incorporated by the Dominion Parliament. A large number of companies are affected, including the Mutual Relief Society of Yarmouth, N. S.

The Germans Must Go.

BERLIN, Oct. 9. Despatches from Damaraland say that the paramount Chief has ordered all Germans to quit the country, and has seized the German missionaries as hostages for the safety of native agents imprisoned by the Germans.

FREDERICTON, N. B., Oct. 9. The horse races here this afternoon were a great success. In the two year old colt race Sheriff Sterling's Bessie Clay beat J. C. Mahon's Emma F. in two straight heats. In the 2 40 class Carvill's Speculator won.
