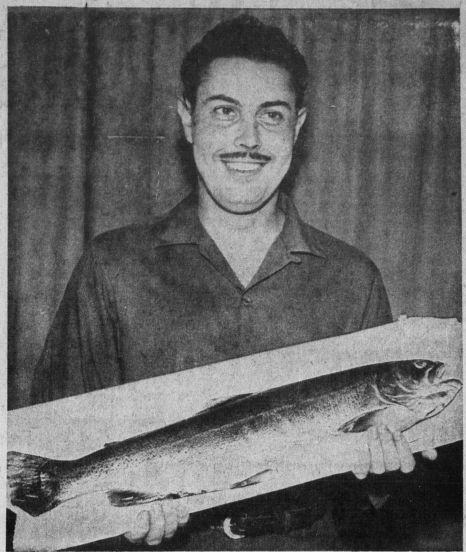


Parents Say Poisoned Fish Found In Children
