TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER. Ottawa Notes.

OTTAWA, June 9. Hon. Mr. Foster is announced to speak at a meeting of the Temperance Congress, at New York, next week, on the subject of "The Experiment of Prohibition in Canada."

The Premier visited the Methodist conference this morning, and received a hearty welcome, to which he made a characteristic and appropriate ten minutes reply. The Presbyterian Assembly meets here this week.

Cyclone and Waterspout.

HALIFAX, June 9. A miniature cyclone struck the city at 2 o'clock this afternoon, and the harbor was lashed into fury. The British warship Bisson dragged her anchor half way across the harbor. A waterspout rose alongside the British warship Canada, and ascended as high as the masts, but broke, and the enormous quantity of water fell back into the harbor, without doing any damage. Several small schooners coming up the harbor were blown about like so many toys. One vessel had her sails carried away. In the streets a number of awnings were carried away.

The Workmen Object.

COLUMBUS, Ohio, June 9. At noon the Street Car Company attempted to run cars, but were interrupted by fully 10,000 workmen, who suddenly made their appearance, blocking Long Street and derailing a car. Another car started out, but was stopped at High Street, lifted off the track and placed across the street. The company contemplate asking for the aid of the military.

Big Libel Suit.

LONDON, June 9. George Washington Butterfield, an American, has brought action for libel against the Financial News, placing damages at £100,000. The alleged libel consisted of a statement published by the Financial News, asserting that the mining operations in the United States, in which Butterfield is interested, was an impudent and wild scheme.

Quebec Elections.

MONTREAL, June 9. Nominations throughout the Province takes place to-morrow. St. Antoine, Pontiac and Two Mountains will probably return Opposition men unopposed.

QUEBEC, June 9. A telegram received from Care Labelle, in Rome, informs Hon. Mr. Mercier that the Pope consents and even desires that Father Labelle should remain Deputy Minister of Agriculture.
