A HANDSOME STRUCTURE.—The new Methodist church in Montreal opened last Sunday, is one of the handsomest specimens of ecclesiastical architecture in Canada. It will seat 2,700 people, and its cost was \$600,000. The St. James' street church, which it supersedes, was an historic building in which the voices of all the great lights of Methodism have been heard. This structure was opened in 1845, and was built at an expense of \$45,000. Its site is occupied by offices, the rentals from which reach \$42,000 annually. After paying the interest of the sum borrowed to put up the offices there will be a balance of \$20,000 a year to the credit of the church funds—a very fine endowment.

KING'S COLLEGE.

Honors Conferred

CO-EDUCATION.

WINDSOR, N. S., June 28.

The convocation of King's College took place to-day at Windsor. The degree of D. D. was conferred upon Rev. Canon Brigstocke, of St. John; D. C. L. upon Rev. Dr. Rand, the famous Micmac missionary and writer; M. A. upon Rev. C. Croucher, of British Columbia; M. A. in course upon Rev. C. E. Willets, and B. A. upon graduates F. S. Redden, C. S. Martin, Rev. H. H. Pitman and Rev. D. P. Allison.

Rev. Dr. Willets was appointed President of the college. Strong pleas were made by Archdeacon Kauback, Dr. Willets, Dr. Brigstocke, and Bishop Courtney for increased financial support for the college.

There were twenty-five students, of whom five were graduated. Bishop Courtney advocated co-education of sexes in King's College.

The Military College.

KINGSTON, Ont., June 27.

The Royal Military College closed to-day. There were fifteen graduates. Company Sergt-Major H. S. Rogers, of Peterboro, secured the gold medal given by Lord Stanley, Sergt. P. E. Murray, of Halifax, N. S., the silver medal, and D. H. Fraser, of Kingston, the bronze medal. W. A. H. Kerr, Battalion Sergt-Major, won the sword for good conduct and discipline. Commissions in the Imperial Army are offered to Royal Engineers, H. S. Rogers of the Royal Artillery, G. H. M. Baker of the Royal Infantry, C. E. Murray and W. A. Hamilton.

H. S. Rogers secured Lord Stanley's prize for the best qualified graduate who will follow the military profession.

Life at St. Andrew's.

ST. ANDREW'S, N. B., June 27.

The town is brimming with excitement over the opening of the Algonquin to-morrow. Already distinguished guests are beginning to pour in.

The cruiser Dream arrived in port this evening from an extended cruise on the north shore of Grand Manan and Quoddy River since last Friday. She reports the hand-line fishing as extremely good in all the grounds, more particularly at Grand Manan. Herring for sardines are very scarce.

The Portuguese Matter.

LONDON, June 27.

Advices from Delagoa Bay say a British gunboat is expected on Saturday, and the railway employees are preparing to make a forcible resistance to any attempt on the part of Portugal to take charge of constructing the road. The company to whom Portugal granted a concession to build the Delagoa Bay Railway, and the Chamber of Commerce will request the London Stock Exchange and European Bourses to cease quoting Portuguese securities until Portugal has made reparation.

A Generous Opponent.

QUEBEC, June 27.

In his speech at St. Jean Baptiste banquet, Hon. Mr. Laurier, in alluding to the distinguished men which Canada has produced, referred to his great adversary, Sir John Macdonald, paying a high tribute to his remarkable intellect, to his knowledge of men, and declaring that he was equal to measure swords with the greatest statesmen in Europe.

The Premier leaves for his summer residence at River du Loup to-morrow. He will probably remain there five or six weeks. Commander Gordon, of the fisheries service, has been appointed a Commissioner of Police, with powers as such throughout Canadian territory.
