**Morell "Makes It" On First Attempt**

An outstanding record was established in Morell yesterday morning when 101 donors, reported to the Red Cross Clinic in Memorial Hall. The objective was more than reached and this was a great credit to the Committee which organized such a fine Clinic. Members of the Catholic Women's League, the Women's Institute and the Canadian Legion share the honors for this and left no stone unturned to insure the reaching of the quota and they met with whole-hearted co-operation on all sides. Donors came in large numbers from Morell itself as well as from Morell East and Rear and the following other districts, Pisquid East, Mount Stewart, Bristol, Head of Hillsboro, St. Peter's Bay, and Bangor. Doctors and clergymen in this section did much towards the success of this clinic in addition to what was done by the Morell Committee.

Members of the Women's Institute and the Catholic Women's League provided delicious refreshments for the donors as well as helpers invaluable assistance with the setting up and taking down of the clinic equipment. They also transported the donors to and from Morell. Storekeepers in the area assisted greatly by allowing the Committee to post signs in their stores. This was the best result ever achieved for a first clinic in any rural centre in the province, and was all the more remarkable because it was held in the morning when it is usually difficult for both donors and workers to leave their ordinary occupations to attend a clinic of this kind. Undoubtedly the people of Morell and vicinity realized the desperate plight of the Blood Transfusion Service and rallied magnificently to its support. Congratulations are due to all who in any way contributed towards making this Clinic the outstanding success it was.

The Beaver Club Hall in Montague was a beehive of activity last evening from the time the Blood Donor Clinic opened at 7 o'clock until the last donor was through at nearly ten o'clock. All previous records were broken at Montague last night when 102 donors from Montague itself but in addition volunteers came from twenty-six of the surrounding districts namely—Murray Harbor North, Murray River, Cardigan, Brooklyn, Albion, Glen William, Sturgeon, Heatherdale, Cambridge, Caledonia, Caspereaux, Grand View, Belle-

vue, New Perth, Whim Road, Peter's Road, Kilmuir, Lower Montague, Victoria Cross, Upper Montague, Valleyfield East, Georgetown, Commercial Cross, Brudenell, Summerville and Peake's Road. Such an excellent response proves that the people of Montague and the surrounding districts are fully aware of the great benefits derived from the Red Cross Blood Transfusion Service and well as to Mr. Gilbert Clements who organized the Clinic.

The ladies of the Montague Women's Institute again provided the volunteer workers to assist the Mobile Team as well as tasty refreshments for the large numbers of donors.

The excellent facilities of the Beaver Club Hall which was so

kindly loaned by the ladies of this Club through Mrs. Preston McIntyre were very much enjoyed by the workers as well as the donors. Red Cross officials last night expressed sincere appreciation to all who had contributed towards making the Montague Clinic the terrific success it was. If the same results can be achieved at the Clinics to be held today at the R. C. A. F. Station Summerside itself the province can be assured of a sufficient supply to repay its indebtedness and provide for the needs for the next three months.
