been entered as a rear window was
broken. When Mr. R. A. Horne,
the proprietor, was called he came
down and found that a radio and
two pens had been taken. About
thirty dollars in the cash regis-
ter was not touched.

The second break occurred at
Robinson's Bakery, Water Street
East, which was discovered about
five o'clock yesterday morning
when the first member of the staff
arrived for work. Mr. Wilfred
Kelly, the owner, said yesterday
that a portable typewriter had
been taken and although nothing
else was missing all the office
drawers had been ransacked.

into the main building.
