## Need Technicians For Indo-China

OTTAWA, (CP)—Australia has proposed that Canada send French-speaking technicians to help the Indochina states of Laos, Cambodia and Viet Nam.

R. G. Casey, Australian foreign minister, told a press conference today the Indochina states have appealed for a wide range of technicians from weather men to auto mechanics.

These states were French-speaking, and Australia did not have French-speaking personnel. She told reporters, he suggested to External Affairs Minister Pearson some time ago that Canada provide this assistance from her French-speaking population in Quebec, Australia, for her part, would provide bulldozers, trucks and other equipment.

## To Officiate At Opening Ceremonies

OTTAWA, (CP)—Vice-Admiral E. R. Mainguy, chief of the Canadian naval staff, left by air today for Victoria to officiate at the opening ceremonies of two new naval establishments on the Pacific coast.

He will open HMCS Venture Thursday, a new naval officers training establishment at Esquimalt, B. C., which is under command of Capt. R. P. Welland of Ottawa and Halifax. Friday Admiral Mainguy will officiate at ceremonies marking the opening of the Pacific naval laboratory at Esquimalt where facilities have been made available for defence scientists making studies and surveys on the Pacific coast.

## Air Carriers Income Higher

OTTAWA (CP)—Net operating income of Canadian air carriers for June was up 31 per cent from June of last year, the first such comparative increase since September, 1953.

The increase resulted from reduced operating expenses and a small rise in gross revenues, the bureau of statistics reported Friday. Net income in June was \$1,393,660, compared with \$1,065,000. Operating expenses were \$8,547,117 against \$8,823,194, while operating revenues were \$9,940,777 compared with \$9,888,249.

## Americans to Pass Judgment on Rep. Administration in November

NEW YORK, (CP)—The United States next month will pass judgment on a Republican administration for the first time in 22 years. The judgment will not be final, for President Eisenhower himself is not up for re-election until 1956. But the fate of his party in the congressional elections Nov. 2 will depend as much on public reaction to the record of his first two years in office as on the way the Republican-dominated 83rd Congress dealt with his legislative proposals.

With the thinnest of majorities in both houses—two votes in the 96-seat Senate and four in the 435-member House of Representatives—the Republicans are fighting hard to keep the Democrats from gaining control.

## MUST REVERSE TREND

Not since Franklin D. Roosevelt was given added Democratic strength in the mid-term elections of 1934 has a party in power escaped the "off-year" trend, which traditionally gives the opposition an increase in vote in elections in which the presidency is not at stake.

The Republicans, with 49 seats to the Democrats' 46 and one independent in the Senate and with 218 representatives against the Democrats' 213 in the House, where one seat is held by an independent and three are vacant, must reverse the trend again or accept congressional defeat.

Almost the entire membership of the House will be elected to a new two-year term in November. The six-year term of 32 senators have expired and there will be additional elections for four or five other seats where vacancies have been temporarily filled by appointment in the last two years.

Thirty-two state governors and a number of other state and municipal officials also will be elected.

In a campaign which thus far has lacked an outstanding issue, economic and agricultural problems have taken the spotlight from such 1950 headline-makers as the Far East, corruption and Communists in government, which played a big part in Eisenhower's sweeping presidential victory over Democratic candidate Adlai Stevenson.

## LIKE PLANS SPEECHES

Eisenhower, whose personal popularity is almost unanimously challenged, has planned only a few speeches during the campaign al-

though some Republican leaders are reported anxious to step up his activities. Others are reported anxious lest a congressional setback damage the president's prestige if he commits himself too deeply in the campaign.

Vice-President Nixon is campaigning vigorously in all parts of the country with the plea that only a Republican-controlled Congress can ensure the success of Eisenhower's legislative program.

Democratic spokesmen, headed by Stevenson, counter this argument by contending that Democratic votes in both houses saved a number of key administration proposals from defeat by recalcitrant Republicans. They promise opposition support for "constructive" Eisenhower legislation.

In a country where regional interests and the nonconformity of individual legislators frequently cut across congressional party lines, promises by party leaders are frequently hard to fulfill. But a Republican-dominated Congress would give the president a better opportunity to deal with friendly majority leaders and com-

mittee chairmen in steering his proposals through the two houses. The Republicans are under fire on farm issues. Many farmers resent their abandonment of high and rigid price supports in favor of a flexible system of production and price fluctuations. Agriculture Secretary Ezra Taft Benson argues that the flexible program eventually will prove beneficial to both producers and consumers. The Democrats contend that many farmers, particularly in dairy areas, have suffered losses in revenue without a compensating decrease in operation costs.

## DEBATE ECONOMIC PICTURE

The parties are similarly at odds over the economic picture. Nixon has described 1954 as "the most prosperous peacetime year in American history."

But Stevenson quoted other figures depicting decreases in national income and average weekly earnings, rising unemployment and an all-time peak in the cost of living. The Democrats argue the tax reductions benefit corporations and the higher-income brackets at the expense of the small wage-earner.
