TODAY, NO. 7: CHRIST SCOURGED

As a boy, Michelangelo Buonarroti (1475-1564) wanted to do nothing except draw. Consequently, his father sent Michelangelo in his teens to an artist's studio in Florence to study. The youth's interest turned to sculpture, and it was as sculptor and painter of frescoes that Michelangelo became an immortal. He scored painting on canvas. In the course of decorating the Sistine Chapel at the Vatican with the Biblical scenes which are his greatest masterpieces, Michelangelo made many cartoons like this one which is reproduced from an engraving by S. del Piombo. It, of course, shows the scourging of Jesus, as told in St. Mark 15:15-20.

And so Pilate, willing to content the people, released Barabbas unto them, and delivered Jesus, when he had scourged him, to be crucified.

And the soldiers led him away into the hall, called Praetorium; and they call together the whole band.

And they clothed him with purple, and platted a crown of thorns, and put it about his head.

And began to salute him, Hail, King of the Jews! And they smote him on the head with a reed, and did spit upon him, and bowing their knees worshipped him. And when they had mocked him, they took off the purple from him, and put his own clothes on him, and led him out to crucify him.

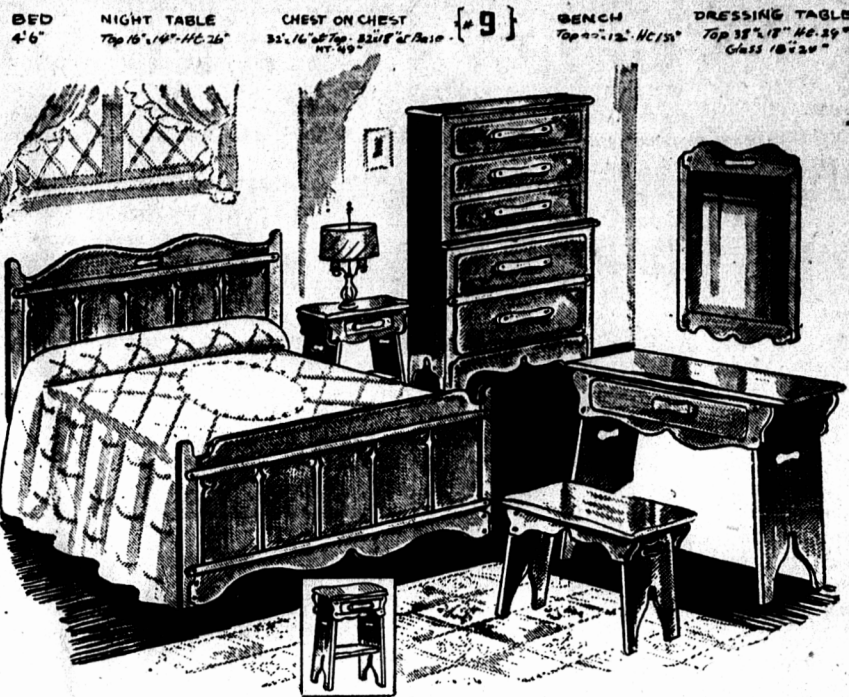
