THE MEN FOR QUEEN'S COUNTY.

It is pleasing to report at the beginning of the second week of the campaign, that Opposition candidates are in the field for every district of Queen's County. The candidates in the first district need no introduction to their electors. Both the Hon. William Campbell and Mr. D. B. McLeod are well known residents of the district, honest and able. In their case, it is only necessary to know that, if elected, they will vote to drive the Farquharson administration out of office. The candidates for the second district—those who are to "beard the lion in his den" and "the Douglass in his hall"—are well worthy of the honor that they will win if they succeed. Mr. Ephraim Gallant is a native of the district, a leading farmer, largely interested in the cheese factory of his neighborhood and in agricultural matters generally. We venture to predict that, if elected, Mr. Gallant will make a capital representative of our farming interests. The fact that he is a French-Canadian and a man of honor will doubtless win for him not only the support of his own compatriots but also the support of his fellow farmers sprung from other nationalities,—all, indeed, who think that the Farquharson Government ought to be put out. Mr. Mellish is a well known barrister of Charlottetown—though it is his pleasure, during the summer, to reside among those whom he hopes will become his constituents. He is a good speaker, well acquainted with the constitution and conditions of the country—and he will, if elected, be a valuable acquisition to our provincial Legislature. In the third district we have Mr. Peter McCourt and Mr. T. A. McLean,—the former an experienced and able journalist, intimate with provincial politics, and the latter one of our most skilful and prominent manufacturers,—both capital speakers and able to discuss in the Legislature every question connected with the chief interests of the Province. For the fourth district, Messrs A. A. McLean, Q. C., and Henry Wood are the candidates. Mr. McLean is a native of the district as well as one of the most prominent of our lawyers. He took a leading part in the proceedings of last session showing up the Pineau affair, and winning the applause of his supporters and the country at large. Mr. Wood is a prominent resident of the district—one of the people themselves, a good speaker and well acquainted with the districts wants and interests. Then we have in Charlottetown Mr. James Paton, a leading and successful merchant, a representative Scotchman, and Dr. S. R. one Jenkins of the most skilful and popular of our physicians—one of our own boys. There is encouragement in the prompt response of Queen's County to the call for able and discreet men for business to stand for election.

We hope soon to hear that both

Prince and King's Counties have full tickets in the field in opposition to the Farquharson Government.

RETIREMENT OF SIR LOUIS DAVIES.

A story is going the rounds of the press to the effect that Sir Louis Davies, is about to retire from political life to accept a position on the Supreme Court bench at Ottawa. The portfolio of Minister of Marine, is, it is understood, to go to Mr. Emmerson, of New Brunswick. It is said that this "deal" was contemplated before the election, but for obvious reasons the fact was not made known.

The Fredericton Herald has this to say regarding the matter: "The story goes that Sir Louis Davies will shortly retire from political life to accept a position on the supreme court bench at Ottawa, and that his successor in the Dominion government as minister of marine and fisheries will be none other than our much esteemed friend, Hon. Dr. Emmerson. We are not giving this under the inspiration of anybody, only as a report, but we trust that things may work out that way."

And the St. John Sun remarks as follows:

"It is understood that the chief reason for bringing on the P. E. Island election at this time is the proposed retirement of Sir Louis Davies from political life. The minister of marine is about to hand over his portfolio to Mr. Emmerson and take a non-political office. This departure would damage Mr. Farquharson's chances if the provincial election took place afterwards. Therefore the election is to be got over, and then it will be made known that Prince Edward Island has no longer a minister at Ottawa."

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

THE Moncton Times rises to remark that Sir Louis Davies will act about as promptly in ferreting out the ballot box thief in West Prince as his government did in punishing the ballot switchers in West Huron.

It is reported that at the Liberal convention at Souris on Saturday Alexander Robertson and Thomas Kickham were nominated. The latter is away from home just now, and if he declines to accept the nomination it will be tendered Mr. Lauchlan Macdonald, of Lakeville. Mr. James R. McLean also has been turned down.
