Uruguay Denounces 'Johnson Doctrine'

UNITED NATIONS (AP)—Uruguay has denounced what it called the new "Johnson doctrine" and suggested the UN Security Council call for a cease fire and an immediate end to unilateral military action in the Dominican Republic.
But Ambassador Carlos Mariz Velazquez of Uruguay suggested also the council could support the actions of the Organization of American States in the crisis.
Bolivian Ambassador Fernando Ortiz Sanz recommended the OAS be given the major role.
Velazquez and Ortiz Sanz, whose countries are non-permanent members of the council, spoke for the first time in the continuing debate.
Before they spoke, Nikolai T. Fedorenko, the Soviet delegate, formally introduced a resolution seeking council condemnation of U.S. military intervention and demanding an immediate withdrawal of the U.S. armed forces.
He asserted the OAS declaration under which Cuba was excluded as a Communist nation could not be cited as justification for unilateral military intervention.

Lady Churchill Undecided On Selection of New Title

LONDON (CP)—A spokeswoman for Lady Churchill, created a life peer in the honors list announced Saturday, says it may be several weeks before a decision is made on her new title.
"Lady Churchill will be conferring with experts from the College of Heralds and others concerned before a choice is made," her secretary said.
No duplication of titles is permitted and there must be a thorough investigation of any proposed title to make sure that a similar style does not already exist. There are a number of Churchills among the peers of the realm.
As the wife of the late Sir Winston Churchill she already has the title Lady Churchill, but as a peeress in her own right she would be entitled to call herself Lady Clementine or, if she prefers, Baroness Clementine. An example of this is the wife of former prime minister Harold Macmillan who uses the title Lady Dorothy—not Lady Macmillan—because she is a peeress in her own right and not by marriage.
Most peers include in their formal titles the name of some town, city, constituency or other geographic location. Thus if Lady Churchill decides to keep the Churchill name she presumably would be called "Lady (or Baroness) Clementine Churchill of ..."—adding a place name of her choice.
Once a unique title is agreed upon and approved it will be made public officially in the London Gazette, the government publication handling all official declarations.

Social Creditor Says PCs Don't Want Election Now

OTTAWA (CP)—A Social Credit MP said here many Conservatives didn't vote for the New Democratic Party motion of non-confidence last Thursday because they were afraid the government would be defeated.
Gerard Chapdelaine (SC—Sherbrooke) said during the Commons budget debate some Conservatives didn't know the government would survive the motion of non-confidence because members of the Social Credit party had decided to vote against the motion.
The NDP motion was defeated 106 votes to 90. Thirty-one of the 94 Conservative MPs were either absent or didn't vote because they were paired with other absent members.
Mr. Chapdelaine said more Conservatives were present in the chamber for the non-confidence vote Monday night because they knew Social Credit MPs would side with the minority Liberal government once again and thus avert a defeat for the administration.
The second non-confidence motion moved by the Conservatives was defeated 111 to 100. Eighty-one Conservatives cast ballots and another five declared that they were paired.
Mr. Chapdelaine, a Sherbrooke lawyer elected to the Commons in 1962, said the country would be involved in a general election now but for his party which refused to take part "in the game" the other parties were playing.
He said the Canadian people don't want an election now and added it would not solve any problems. Politicians who thought their parties would gain a majority of seats in the Commons through an election should read public opinion polls.
He said the Social Credit party is the only one showing responsibility through its voting pattern in the Commons.

Archbishop Critical Of Berton Book

VICTORIA (CP)—Anglican Archbishop Harold Sexton criticized views on sex and church unity expressed by author Pierre Berton in his book The Comfortable Pew.
Mr. Berton was commissioned to write the book by the Anglican Church of Canada.
The archbishop of British Columbia and the Yukon, said in an address to the 63rd synod of the diocese of B.C. that "it seems he (Berton) regards his opinions as almost infallible."
The author's view that premarital sex is "not always a bad thing," the archbishop said, is "a most unfortunate statement to put before our young people."
"Surely they need the sobering influence of the highest ideals and these, so far as I can see, are entirely absent from the pages of this book."
He said the book's popularity appears to be largely due to its views on sex.
Mr. Berton's view that church unity is hampered by differences of class rather than doctrine is "absolute rubbish," said Archbishop Sexton.
However, he commended chapters of the book dealing with nuclear warfare and the color bar.
"They should be an incentive to every church member to examine his or her attitude to these most important issues."

SEATO Plans Aid To U.S.

LONDON (AP)—Ministers of the Southeast Asia Treaty Organization "planned secret military moves to reinforce U.S. efforts to prevent South Viet Nam's engulfment by communism."
In two sessions delegates of the eight-country alliance appraised the implications of Communist threats in Southeast Asia and mapped military measures to check the Communists' thrusts.
Britain, Australia, New Zealand, Thailand and the Philippines pledged support for the stand the U.S. administration is taking in defence of South Viet Nam. Among the reported steps the SEATO allies intend taking are massive combined military power displays and closer coordination of their forces from the top echelons downward.
