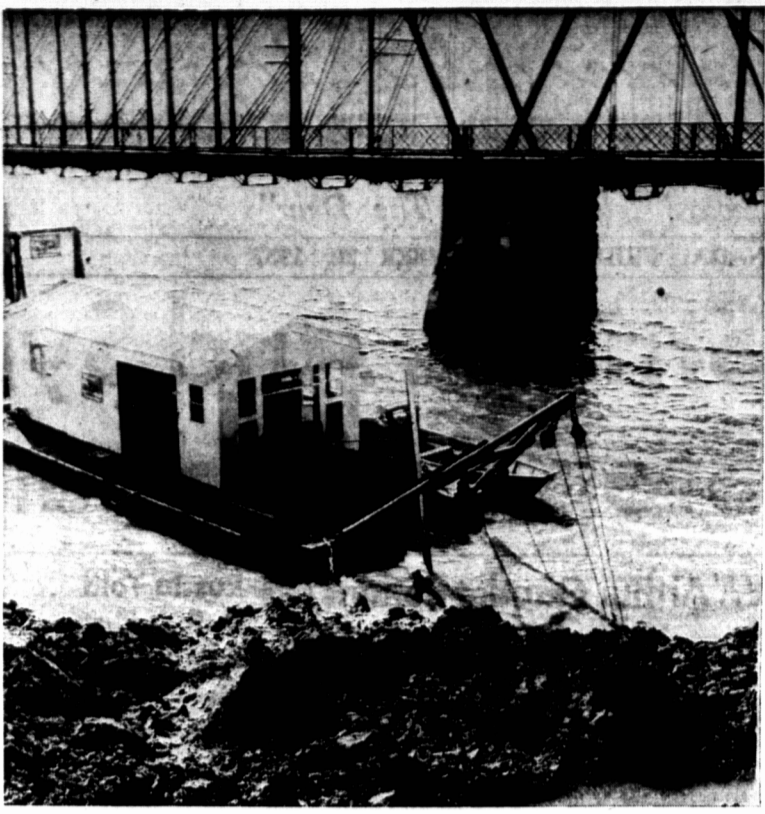

## DREDGE HAS BUSY TIME KEEPING MUD BACK

Mud which has ever been a serious handicap to transportation is causing plenty of worry to engineers in charge of building the Hillsboro Causeway. At the first of the week a suction dredge began drawing the mud away from the extending structure but in spite of the continuous work of the dredge, the mud wave still continues to mount as the fill is put in place. Precautions have to be taken to prevent the mud pressure from causing damage to the bridge piers. The bridge must carry all traffic to the south eastern end of the Island while the causeway is under the construction. Hauling of the fill had to be suspended for a time this week in order to allow the dredge to get ahead of the accumulating mud. Experts express the opinion that the mud which covers the river bottom to a maximum depth of 51 feet may well present a serious problem all the way across.

## Substantial Surplus In Diocesan Charity Drive

Going over the top with a substantial surplus which brought the total to \$770,900, the Roman Catholic diocesan canvas for the Bishop's charity campaign set at \$750,000 was brought to a close yesterday. The immediate objective of the campaign is to provide funds for additional facilities for the Sacred Heart Home, St. Vincent's Orphanage and the Catholic Family Centre. In commenting on the success of the campaign, Dr. Duffy said it would please all concerned very much to place before His Excellency Bishop MacEachern the results of their effort on his return to the province. The results of the drive, indicated by Deaneries was as follows:—(1) Tignish, E.C. Gaudette \$125,400—(2) Summerside, Henry Wedge, \$181,000—(3) Charlottetown, George W. Cheverie \$285,000—(4) Cardigan A. Fraser \$91,000—(5) Souris, John Mullally and Melvin McQuaid \$88,500. Every parish in the forty-four comprising the Diocese, contributed towards the project.

## Increased Family Allowance Payments For Many Families

Mr. Alfred S. Tait, Regional Director of Family Allowances, Charlottetown, announces that most families will today be receiving increased cheques out of Federal Government funds as a result of the new rates which are effective this month. This is the only increase in payments since the first cheques were issued in the month of July, 1945. Prior to this month, Family Allowances were payable at the following rates, with increases effective in the month following the child's sixth, tenth and thirteenth birthdays: Children under 6 years of age, \$5 per month; Children from 6 until 10, \$6 per month; Children from 10 until 13, \$7 per month; Children from 13 until 16, \$8 per month. Family Allowances are now to be paid at the following rates: Children under 10 years of age, \$6 per month; Children from 10 until 16, \$8 per month. Under the old rates of payment a parent would receive a total of \$1188 on behalf of a child for the sixteen years whereas a parent will now receive a total of \$1296 until such time as the child reaches the age of 16 years. This represents an increase of \$108 in the actual amount received by the parent during these 16 years. The gross expenditure in Family Allowance payments in this province for September amounts to \$244,516 as compared to an expenditure of \$222,843 last month, thus making an increased expenditure of \$21,673. The average payment per family this month is \$18.52 as compared to an average amount of \$16.90 for the month of August, 1957. The Regional Director urges parents to apply promptly for new born children if the parents do not wish to lose payments for any of the months following the child's month of birth. Under the legislation a parent is allowed thirty days to make application on behalf of a new born child in order to effect payment of allowances commencing with the month following the month of the child's birth. In those cases where the registration form is not received in the Regional Director's office within thirty days of the child's birth, payment of allowances commences with the month following the month when the registration form is received. Registration of a child for Family Allowances and registration of a child's birth with the Provincial Vital Statistics authorities are two separate operations. In other words, birth registration does not constitute registration for Family Allowances. Family Allowances Registration Forms are available at all post offices, hospitals and at the office of the Regional Director. In Charlottetown the Regional Office is located on the fifth floor of the Confederation Building on Queen Street.

## Outlines Some Needs Facing Retailers In The Maritimes

An early request for legislation to bring a measure of uniformity in the diversified collection laws of the Maritime Provinces, a concerted attack on the knotty problem of store hours, and the necessity of independent retailers forming themselves into buying groups were some of the points discussed here last night by F. Arnold B. Rands, Toronto, General Manager of the National Foods Division, Retail Merchants Assn. of Canada Inc. Mr. Rands was speaking to a representative group of retailers assembled at City Hall. He was introduced to the gathering by Mr. Fulton Pierce, Charlottetown.

The speaker indicated that Maritime collection law was under study by Association lawyers in all three provinces, and that it was the intention of the R.M.A.'s Maritime branch to present briefs on this matter at the next sessions of the provincial legislatures. Speaking of store hours, Mr. Rands said, "Area closing by-laws not too satisfactory," indicating that in his opinion hours of business should be laid down by legislation and should apply on a provincial level, adding that this was a job that would have to be carried out by a provincial committee. **GUARANTEED LOANS** The Toronto businessman said that the Canadian Retail Merchants national organization had waited on the former federal government on two occasions requesting that \$150 millions be made available so that independent retailers wishing to modernize or expand could borrow for long terms at reasonable rates. Though these request were not granted, he said, it was the intention of the national body to bring its problem to the attention of the new government now in office.
