The British Boxing Board of Control said it had no sympathy with Williams' claim to have received a spiritual message instructing him not to go through with a July 2 fight against Dick Richardson of Wales.

Teddy Waltham, secretary of the British Board said "a promoter who has sold nearly 12,000 tickets cannot be subject to the whim of a boxer."

In the fourth dash the winner, All Budlong, who was a double-dash winner on this exciting racing card, equalled his record of 2:15. Dunlop B. was also a double-dash winner.

The fastest time of the night was 2:12/1, clocked by Mr. Jolliscott in the sixth dash. This chestnut gelding is owned by Rogers & Hill of Charlottetown and was reined by Joe Hennessey.

Pari-mutuels were also quite good with the first daily-double on a combination of Allablaze and Jolly Bud paying \$39.60. The quinella paid \$37.80 on a combination of All Budlong and Vivian Strong, and the second daily double, on the 6th and 7th race, paid \$59.20.

New Forest, in the seventh dash, paid \$17.80 to place and the highest win pay was on All Budlong in the 4th race, \$12.70.

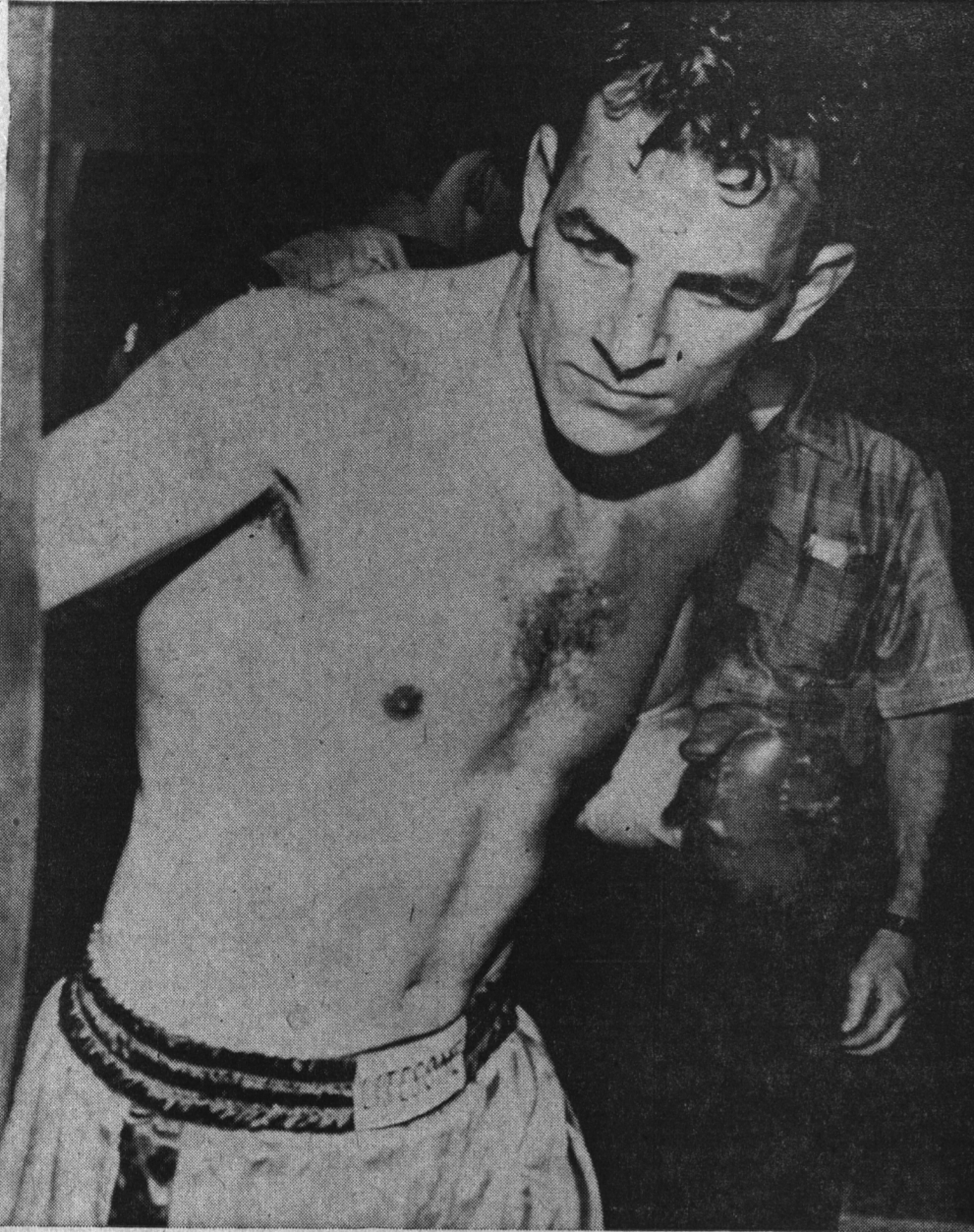
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HOLT TUNES UP

Giants Back In Top Spot; Cubs Grab Doubleheader

San Francisco Giants vaulted atop Milwaukee and back into the National League lead Sunday by edging the Braves 6-5. Rookie outfielder Felipe Alou singled home the winning run in the bottom of the ninth.

Chicago Cubs also advanced, routing their way into the first division with 3-2 and 2-1 victories over Philadelphia Phillies. In their NL contests, Los Angeles odgers swept two from Cincinnati, 3-0 and 3-2, and Pittsburghirates grabbed a pair from St. Louis, 10-8 and 8-6.

In the American League, Detroit hitters did what the National League all-stars couldn't, knock Baltimore's Billy O'Dell off the mound—and went on to win a doubleheader from the Orioles, 6-5 and 5-3.

New York Yankees gained a lead with Chicago White Sox, losing 7-4 and winning 5-4. Washington downed Kansas City twice, 9 and 4-3 and Cleveland scored even unearned runs to drop Boston in Red Sox 9-4.

EROCIS IN THE NINTH

Milwaukee lost its clutch on the national League leadership for the first time since June 11 when relief pitching failed to stop the Giants. Alou's single, which drove home Willie Mays with the winning run, came off Ernie Johnson, who suffered his first defeat against three victories.

Nineteen-year-old rookie left-hander Mike McCormick, the first Giant pitcher, gained his 10th triumph against one setback. McCormick's two-base error on a throw in the top of the ninth had helped the Braves come to a single run to tie the game.

At Chicago, two bullpen graduates came through for the Cubs. Johnny Briggs set the Phillies down with seven hits in the opener, while Dave Hillman gained a second victory against no losses with a six-hitter. The Cubs now are a half-game ahead of the fifth-place Phillies.

Lee Walls and Alvin Dark provided most of the Cub hitting, walls clubbed his 19th homer in the third inning of the opener, followed with six straight singles. Dark singled four times in the nightcap. Curt Simmons was the loser in the second game, in which neither team won a walk.

Los Angeles hit five home runs winning behind their youngsters, pitchers, Stan Williams and Bob Allombardo. Clem Labine came in relief in each game. Don Swcombe, an ex-Dodger, was Cincinnati loser in the opener, and Joe Nuxhall lost the second contest.

Bob Skinner did the slugging in the Pirates in their first-time victory at St. Louis, and Bill Mazerowski's 4-for-4 game led the way in the nightcap. Skinner had five hits, including his sev-

enth homer, while Mazerowski rapped his 10th homer and batted in three runs in the second game.

The Pirates lost the services of third baseman Gene Baker who ruptured a leg ligament and may miss the rest of the season.

KALINE HURTS

Detroit's double victory in Baltimore was saddened by an injury to outfielder Al Kalina, who was hit by a fast inside pitch from Charley Beamon. He has a painful bruise on the right wrist, but no bones were broken. He was one of three Tigers hit at the plate, the others apparently not being hurt seriously.

The Orioles almost pulled the second game out of the fire for young O'Dell, who failed to hold a two-run lead.

They loaded the bases but Bill Fischer, who finished up both games for the Tigers, squelched the rally.

In Washington, Camilo Pascual pitched six-hit ball to shut out the Athletics in the opener, and Eddie Yost hit two home runs to show the way in the 4-2 night cap victory.

John Romonosky went seven innings to pick up the second-game victory for the Senators.

The Yankees had to go 10 innings to edge Chicago in the second game. Jerry Lumpe's pinch single with the bases loaded earned the split. The Sox roughed up Don Larsen and Duke Maas in two big innings to take the opener 7-4 for Billy Pierce.

Recent acquisitions Woody Heid and Vic Power provided the punch for Cleveland against the turning Red Sox. Cal McLish turned in a six-hitter for his seventh triumph. Held drove in five
