CIVILIZING THE SAVAGE.—A ship laden with \$90,000 worth of New England rum left Boston last week for the usual destination for such cargoes—the dark continent. From July 1, 1890, to the corresponding date in 1891, the exports of this sort from Boston to ports in Africa were 1,018,591 gallons, valued at \$1,223,889. During the past year this trade has almost doubled in quantity and value. The number of gallons exported in the twelve months ending July 1, 1890, was 518,336, as against 1,018,591 the year just ended, and the value was only \$656,216 as against \$1,223,889 in the year just past.

TELEPHONE COMPANY.—A meeting of the stockholders of this company was held yesterday to consider the extension of its lines in terms of the act of the last session of the Legislature and the advisability of proceeding with the work. Estimates of the cost were furnished, amounting to \$12,500, after which it was resolved to open subscription lists at Summerside, Charlottetown and Georgetown, and a decision on the question whether to proceed with the work was postponed to await the result of the subscriptions. If the public wish telephone extension they have now a chance of promoting such facilities by investing their money in the enterprise.

A ROAD MAKING MACHINE.—A special from Westmoreland to the Transcript, of Ancherst, says: "Mr. Albert Palmer, M. P. P., for Queen's County, has lately been down to the eastern end of the county trying to introduce the Champion Road Machine, for which he is agent. A fair test was made at Westmoreland Point, in the presence of Mr. McQueen, and about 30 of the inhabitants of the locality, and all were well pleased with the work done and satisfied that it will quite revolutionize the making of roads. Mr. Palmer left Point de Bate on Saturday for P. E. I., where he intends introducing the machine. As the Government there feel anxious to see some use in that Province, if they are all that they are claimed to be," Mr. Palmer is now here.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

The Election Franchise Act.

Registration of Voters.

OTTAWA, July 30. The Senate reassembled yesterday. A large amount of Government business was transacted in the House yesterday. A bill to amend the Election Franchise Act was read a third time. It provides for extension to the 15th August as the last day for receiving applications to be placed on the voters list.

This bill will be put through the Senate, and with others will be assented to tomorrow by the Deputy Governor General.

Cartwright's Amendment

Largest Vote Ever Recorded. Government's Majority 31.

OTTAWA, July 30. Yesterday morning's vote on Cartwright's amendment was the largest ever recorded in the House of Commons. Six members were paired. Gibson (Grit) was absent with one pair, and Savard, Tarte and McGreevy, who were opposed to Cartwright's amendment.

Allowing for the vacant seats in R. Chlieu and Kingston, the Government's majority, according to yesterday's vote, is thirty-one.

THE TARTE-McGREEVY CASE

Robert McGreevy Contradicted.

Why the McGreevys Quarreled.

OTTAWA, July 30. Before the Tarte-McGreevy inquest yesterday George Perley, son of Chief Engineer Perley, flatly contradicted Robert McGreevy's testimony that two thousand dollars had been given him by the Connolly firm to give his father. He had never received it nor heard of it.

Robert McGreevy's evidence was then continued. He would not deny that he had abstracted his brother's private papers. He had quarrelled with his brother Thomas four years ago, because Thomas had denounced him as a thief, after thirty years of dealing together.

Thomas McGreevy's evidence was ordered for this morning.

Public Accounts Enquiry

The Investigation Continued.

No Evidence of Importance.

OTTAWA, July 30. In the Public Accounts Committee a carpenter employed about the Departmental Buildings testified that he had done odd jobs for Hon. Mr. Dewdney after hours for which Dewdney paid him. No irregularity was proved.

A messenger was then examined who testified to performing domestic services at Dewdney's residence, such as waiting at table, etc. He refused to state what Mr. Dewdney paid him, saying that was his own business. Somerville tried to force an answer to this, but the Committee sustained the witness and stopped further impertinent questions.

Other instances of clerks receiving extra pay for extra work were produced, but nothing startling was elicited.

Fishery Bulletin.

(Fisheries Intelligence Bureau Report.) HALIFAX, July 30.—There is still no bait or fishing at Anticosti. The reports read to-night are as follows: Quebec—Cod good at Thunder River, Magpie and Long Point. Very good at Moisie and Sheldrake. Poor at Grand River and Newport Point, but fair at Paspébiac. Good catches of laurce at Thunder River, Moisie, Long Point and Sheldrake. Herring good at Magpie. Poor at Grand River and Newport Point.

New Brunswick—A few cod and salmon at Point Escuminac, but no mackerel. Excellent hauls of hake, haddock, h. dibut and sardines, at Campbell, and a few catches of herring and mackerel. Fishing is still very poor all over the coast. P. E. Island.—The mackerel fishing is schooling to-day off Murray Harbor. Very plentiful at Souris, but all other fish scarce and all fisheries poor at Georgetown, Cape Breton—Herring fishery fair at Port Hawkesbury and good at Cow Bay. Where vessels are getting full fares, but all fishing reported dull at Lunenburg, Arichat, Englishtown and St. Peter's. Mackerel have all left St. Peter's Bay.

Nova Scotia—Cod fishery fair at Isaac's Harbor, but poor at all other points along the coast. A fair catch of very fine herring at Isaac's Harbor, good haul at Liverpool and fair at Point Latour. Mackerel catch fair at Pubnico and John's Island and still fair at Pubnico and Bay. Dog fish are schooling off Liverpool and Port L. tour very plentiful off Liverpool and Port L. tour where they are destroying nets and preventing cod fishing. Herring bait obtaining at Liverpool, N. S., and bait in traps at Campbell, N. B.
