TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

THE BULGARIAN CRISIS.
A Conference to be Held.
TIERNOVA, Nov. 1.
Nearly all the 550 deputies were present in the Sborange, including thirty adherents of Zankoff, and Turkish deputies in national costume. The sancottes appeared for the purpose of protesting against the illegality of the assembly. In view of Europe's apathy to Bulgarian interests, it is believed to be useless to struggle against Russia's ascendancy.
LONDON, Nov. 1.
The Cabinet, at the first council since recess, decided to instruct Sir Wm. White, British Ambassador at Constantinople, to insist upon an immediate conference at Constantinople, to consider the Bulgarian situation, and to demand the suspension of Russian intervention, diplomatic and active, pending the decision of such conference.
The Porte is renewing its entente cordiale with England, and is in favor of the proposed conference. Italy concurs while Russia and France oppose the project. Germany and Austria remain neutral.

Fishery Matters.

OTTAWA, Nov. 1.
Telegrams from Halifax papers to the American press, respecting the customs seizures of American vessels, are officially denied. The provisions of the Treaty of 1818 will be enforced even more rapidly and rigidly than before, the patrol service being now more effective. It is untrue that American fishing vessels will be able, when short of provisions, to obtain supplies without special permits. Hon. Mr. Bowell simply consented to allow American fishing vessels to procure food at Canadian ports on the homeward trip.

Calling on the President.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 1.
Prince Louis Napoleon called at the White House to-day and paid his respects to the President. He was accompanied by his private secretary and Mr. Albert De-Forrester, Secretary of the Italian Legation. The President and Prince conversed together about 15 minutes.

Attempted Murder and Suicide.

NEW YORK, Nov. 1.
Joseph Off, a German waiter in the Astor House, during a quarrel to-night with Charles Babin, drew a pistol and shot Babin in the side. Two hours later his dead body was found. He had shot himself through the head. Babin may recover.

Mangled in a Coal Mine.

HALIFAX, N. S., Nov. 1.
A terrible accident happened at Spring Hill mines to-day, whereby a workman named Turner was frightfully mangled by a fall of coal. His right arm was torn off, his eye gouged out and his skull crushed.

Schooner Seized.

HALIFAX, N. S., Nov. 1.
The Lunenburg schooner Dalpi was seized at Halifax and fined \$400 for landing some mackerel at Port Hawkesbury, without reporting at the Customs.

The Municipal Elections.

LONDON, Nov. 1.
Municipal elections were held throughout England and Wales yesterday. The returns up to midnight show a Conservative gain of 70, Liberal gain of 65, and Unionist-Liberal gain of 2.

A Queer Case.

ST. CATHERINES, ONT., Oct. 1.
Miss Ellen Priest awoke Thursday morning and found her eyesight, which had been good, gone. Oculists have been unable to relieve her.

Supposed to be Drowned.

PICTON, ONT., Nov. 1.
The boat of Robert Kuskell and son was found on Saturday morning. The men are supposed to be drowned. They belong to Amherst Island.

A \$100,000 Fire.

ROCKPORT, ILL., Nov. 1.
A fire this morning destroyed several buildings in the business part of the town, causing a loss of \$100,000; insurance, \$50,000.

A farmer named Harlow, fell off a load of hay at Brookfield, Queens Co., on Saturday and broke his neck.
