HAS OLD RAILS.—The Sch. Clayola, McDade, arrived yesterday from Charlotte town with a cargo of old rails for the Portland rolling mills.—St. John Sun.

ANOTHER SUDDEN DEATH.—Andrew McFadgen, a well-known resident of Geary, Sunbury County, N. B., dropped dead while working in his blacksmith shop at that place on Friday afternoon. Heart disease was the cause. Deceased was 63 years of age and leaves two sons and one daughter to mourn.

BLOWN ON THE TRACK.—A late despatch from Reading, Pa., says: The high wind of yesterday morning blew over the frame one-story passenger station of the Wilmington and Northern Railroad company at Ridgewood, and it fell across the railroad tracks. Joseph Griffiths saw the building on the tracks and walked ahead to warn the engineer. It was still dark, and as he had no lantern the engineer failed to hear him, although he waved his hat and shouted at the top of his voice. The train plunged through the station. The front of the engine was slightly damaged.

TWENTY-SIX IN ONE FAMILY.—It is doubtful whether another county in the state can equal Worcester in the size of a family. Near Bridgeville lives a colored family consisting of Aaron Quail his wife and twenty-four children. Twenty-three years ago Quail married Martha Ann Rogers, and twenty-four children were born. One child died. There are three sets of twins. Two years ago his wife died; and one year later Quail married again. When the meals are served two tables are used fourteen sitting at one and twelve at the other to avoid the unlucky thirteen.—Baltimore American.

NOVA SCOTIA GOLD MINES.—One of the parties owning the gold areas on Flynn's Island, Sambro, where gold has been taken out of granite, is reported to have been offered \$1,000 for his quarter interest. About thirty pounds of the quartz which was mortgaged, yielded \$60 to the ton! There was a clean up at the Oland mine yesterday and a brick of gold is being run today which it is estimated will go about 160 ounces. It is understood that a syndicate in which local as well as American capital is interested is negotiating for the purchase of the mine. The figures named are not given.—Hfx Echo.

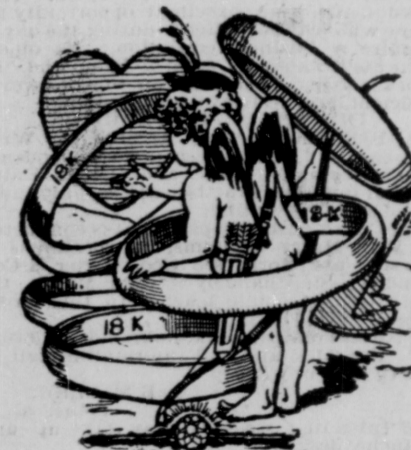
