GAVIN BROS., of Alberton, are building another large lobster factory on Brae shore, and intend doing a much more extensive business next season than ever before. During the past season this enterprising concern put up over 110,000 cans of lobsters.—*Journal*.

F. W. CRAM, Esq., Superintendent of the European and North American Railway, and Mr. H. D. McLeod, Superintendent of the St. John and Maine Railway, and a number of passenger agents from other Railways in the United States, arrived in the city last night, and put up at the "Rankin." This morning in company with Messrs. McNab, and Archibald, they left by special train to pass over the Eastern section of the Railway. They will return to the city to-night, and on Monday, will probably examine the western section of the line.

ISLAND VESSEL LOST.—The Chatham, N. B. *Advance* reports that the bark "Annie McNairn," Johnston, master, arrived at Chatham from Liverpool on Sunday last, bringing the crew of the schooner "Amiel," McDonald, master, bound from Cardigan, P. E. I., to St. Pierre, Miquelon, laden with cattle and produce. The "Amiel" became dismasted about seventy miles N. N. W., of Cape Race, and the crew would have been lost but for the timely aid of Captain Johnson. Twenty-two sheep, three pigs and the vessel's sails were all that was saved in addition to the crew. The names of the crew are: Daniel McDonald, master; Austin Carien, Philip Steele, and Alex. McLean. Malcolm McLean, owner of the vessel and part owner of the cargo, was a passenger. The balance of the cargo was owned by John G. Scrimageour, Esq., of Cardigan, P. E. I. No insurance on either vessel or cargo. The wrecked crew speak in the highest terms of the kindness showed them by Capt. Johnson and his officers. The "Annie McNairn" lay by the "Amiel" from 9 p. m. on the 24th till a. m. on the 25th, and the escape of the latter's crew was under the circumstances providential.

CAPT. JAMES R. McDONALD DROWNED.—A despatch to the *New York Herald* of the 3rd inst., reports that the bark "County of Richmond," (before reported,) left New York Oct. 3, loaded with 602 tons of coal for St. Thomas. On the 12th of October the vessel sprung a leak during the heavy weather and also lost her rudder. On the 14th about 7 o'clock, the cargo shifted, on account of the heavy seas. At 8 a. m. of the 13th, the vessel foundered in lat. 31 04 W, long. 66 37 W. Only two of the crew were saved. The mate, Roderick McDonald, and Henry Lang, seaman, were saved by building a raft, and after six days floating around without food or water they were picked up by the Austrian bark *Lendro*, Capt. Gladulich, and taken to Boston. Great praise is due Capt. Gladulich and his crew, for the dangers they risked in rescuing the shipwrecked men and for the care they took of them when rescued. The crew of the "City of Richmond" consisted of nine men; composed of the captain, James R. McDonald, his brother, the mate, Roderick, and Henry Lang, and six others whose names could not be ascertained, as they shipped in New York. The *Richmond* was owned by the Messrs. Kenny, of Halifax. Captain McDonald was about 27 years of age, and his brother Roderick about 24, and both belong to Prince Edward Island. Lang is about 27 years old. Roderick McDonald was sent by the British Consul to the city hospital.

**Supreme Court.**

MICHAELMAS TERM—QUEEN'S COUNTY.

Mr. Justice Peters presiding.  
*Henry Coombs, appellant, and James Ross and others, respondent.*—This was an appeal from the Charlottetown circuit of the Queen's County Court, and has occupied the time of the court for the last two days. Judge Alley's judgment was reversed and judgment entered for the appellant for \$30 and costs.

*James McWade appellant and James Millar respondent.*—Appeal from the County Court of Queen's County. As the appeal was from a judgment for a sum less than \$5, it was dismissed, but without costs.

*Hugh Ramsay vs. John D. Reid and others.* Mr. Peters, for the plaintiff, obtained a *rule nisi* for a new trial.

*David Ross appellant and Alex. McLeod respondent.*—Appeal from the County Court of Queen's County, and is now being tried.

An order for the examination of Mr. Leith E. Brecken, preparatory to his entering as a law student in the office of Brecken & Fitzgerald, was made.

A similar order was made for Mr. Charles Higgins, who is about to study law in the office of Davies & Sutherland.

**NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.**

EUROPEAN.

DUBLIN, Nov. 4.

At six o'clock this evening criminal informations were lodged in the Crown Office, by W. Lane Joynt, Crown and Treasury Solicitor, on behalf of the Right Honorable Hugh Law, Attorney General for Ireland. The venue is laid in the county of Dublin. The names in the indictment are:—

Many of these names have been added within a few days; Mr. Nally's name was only inserted to-day. The informations extend over nineteen pages and are about one hundred folios in length. They contain nineteen counts, charging the traversers generally with conspiracy—

1. To prevent payment of rents.
2. To defeat legal processes for the enforcement of rents.
3. To prevent the letting of farms from which tenants have been evicted.
4. To excite ill will between different classes of Her Majesty's subjects in Ireland.

To-morrow morning the traversers will be served with subpoenas, containing the gist of the informations and calling upon them to appear within four days of date. Upon their appearance the traversers will have four days to plead, and having pleaded they then put themselves upon the county for trial. The jury under the old system will then be struck. The panel will include forty-eight names. The prosecution may gather some force from the fact that the house of a priest, who is an opponent of the Land League, has been sacked at Limerick. A collision has also occurred between the police and the people at Headford, near Tuam, county Galway; originating in an attempt to remove some drunkards, and it is reported that many were seriously injured on both sides. The Land League has received a letter from the O'Donoghue requesting admission to the League. I understand that Mr. Boynton will raise the question of his American citizenship; but as that point was effectually settled in the Fenian trials it will avail him little.

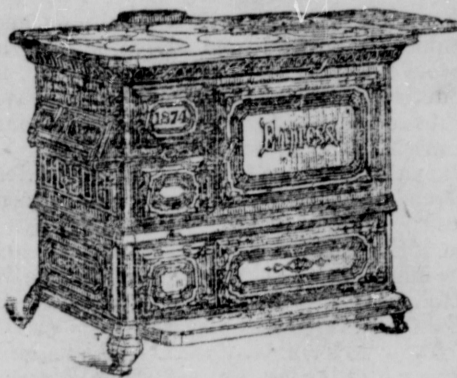
