DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

Mulock's Motion Disposed Of

OTTAWA, July 7. The House of Commons was occupied the whole of yesterday's session in discussing Mr. Mulock's motion to put binder twine on the free list. The motion was defeated by 100 to 800.—Savard voting with the Government, Tarte against.

The Fatal Cyclone

Plays Havoc in a Penitentiary

CHICAGO, July 7. Baton Rouge city was struck by a cyclone yesterday, completely wrecking the penitentiary and killing ten of the convicts, wounding thirty-five, and demolishing several houses. Sixteen persons were killed and many others injured.

The Tarte-McGrevey Case.

OTTAWA, July 7. Before the Tarte-McGrevey investigation yesterday, Murphy's cross examination developed further proofs of his general rascality. He contradicted himself badly and refused to answer several questions.

Fishery Bulletin.

(Fisheries Intelligence Bureau Report.) HALIFAX, July 7.—At the fishing points in Anticosti the fishery of capelin is reported very good to-day at South West Point, and the cod fair, but there are no fish or bait at any of the other stations on the Southern coast of Quebec. The codfishery is reported fair at Perce and Newport Point, but poor at Paspébiac owing to the want of bait. Herring fair at Perce and a few are being netted at Newport Point. Mackerel are reported as taking hooks freely at Mimiugash, P. E. Island, but all other fish are scarce around the coast as far as Alberton. Cod fishery is very good at Georgetown. Mackerel and lobsters are poor and herring are reported struck in off Panmure Island. There were fair catches of herring and mackerel at St. Ann's, C. B., of mackerel at St. Peter's and of herring at Arichat. Herring still good at Lunenburg, N. S., and mackerel fair.

PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE.

HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY.

MONDAY, July 6. In the House of Assembly yesterday the following bills were read a third time and passed: To Amend the Charlottetown Incorporation Act. To Incorporate the Cape Traverse Hall Company. To Incorporate the Watchman Publishing Company. The Budget debate was resumed by Mr. Rogers and continued by Messrs. Warburton, McKay, Robertson, A. McLeod, Shaw, Macdonald and Arsenault. THE EXAMINER'S summary report is unavoidably crowded out of to-day's issue. Hon. Mr. McLean said that the matter was under the consideration of the Government.

July 7. The following bills passed the second reading: The Bill to Incorporate the Charlottetown Cemetery Company. The bill respecting Dental Surgery. Hon. Mr. Peters submitted the following resolutions: Resolved, That it is advisable to introduce a bill authorizing the government to make arrangements with the Telephone Company of Prince Edward Island for the extension of their system of telephones to various sections of this Island hitherto not reached thereby, and for that purpose to authorize the Government to make arrangements for the payment of reasonable subsidies to said company, and also for such extension of the charter as may be reasonable. The resolution was agreed to.

FRIDAY, July 5. Mr. Clow asked the Commissioner of Public Works if it is the intention of the Government to comply with the prayer of a petition of Richard A. Thornton, and others, inhabitants of Lower Montague, praying for a grant of a sufficient sum of money to repair the road leading from Lower Montague to St. Andrews Point on front of Westaway's farm, said road being washed away with storm of last December.

TUESDAY, July 7. Mr. Justice Hodgson presiding. The Queen vs. John T. Connolly. Breaking and entering the premises of Archibald White and stealing money therefrom. In this case the jury last evening brought in a verdict of guilty. Mary Ann McRae vs. Alexander McRae. Action for breach of promise of marriage, with seduction charged as aggravated damages. Now before the court. F. L. Haszard for plaintiff; Arthur Peters for defendant.
