HALIFAX (CP) — The weather office says at 10 p.m. Tuesday Fredericton was already reporting a temperature of 18 degrees as cold air covered all of the Maritimes. Skies were generally cloudy with a few clear spots over central New Brunswick.

A disturbance similar to the one that brought snow to the St. Lawrence valley is developing over southwestern Quebec and is expected to affect all regions today. Snow showers mixed with rain will again accumulate amounts ranging from three to six inches.

Strong winds and cold air will follow behind this weather system, bringing heavy rain and snowfalls to all three provinces Thursday.

Regional forecasts: Prince Edward Island, eastern N.S. and western N.B. will warn of heavy rain; snow beginning during morning hours; heavy rain and snow by evening; very cold; southeasterly winds 30, gusts to 45, light to moderate rain, heavy 35 gusts to 50, low to high at Charlottetown 25 and 31, Monday and 25, Tuesday.

**MEAT HOLDINGS UP**  
OTTAWA (CP)—Cold storage holdings of meat at Nov. 1 totalled 67,000,000 pounds, up from the Oct. 1 total of 62,364,000 pounds and last year's Nov. 1 total of 62,077,000 pounds, the bureau of statistics reported Tuesday.

"For our part we believe that Canadians can afford the plan if they want to — and we believe the great majority of them do," Mr. Gordon said. **Noted Citizen, Businessman Dies In Tignish**

TIGNISH — John MacInloch, a prominent business man and highly respected citizen, died suddenly at his home in Tignish early Monday morning.

A son of the late Mr. and Mrs. William MacInloch he was born at Kildare Caples 76 years ago.

His association with the J.H. Myrick Co. began in 1912 and continued until 1933. In the beginning he was head farmer for the company and later he was in full charge of their fishing business.

He was a director of the mutual Fire Insurance Company for a number of years and was its president at the time of his death.

He was a member of the United Church of Canada and of the Zealand Lodge AF and AM.

Mr. MacInloch was predeceased two years ago by his wife, the former Isabel Travers to whom he was married for 40 years, and by a little daughter, Edith, whose death resulted from an accident in 1938.

He is survived by two sons, Allan and William of Calgary, and a sister, Mrs. A. J. Rankin (Mary) in the Prince County Hospital.

**Increased Pension Costs Described As Not Serious**

OTTAWA (CP)—Although it may be necessary to increase the rate of contributions to the Canada Pension Plan, the cost of the plan is not as serious as some have claimed, Finance Minister Gordon told the Commons today.

He said the starting contribution rate of 3.6 per cent, divided equally between employer and employee, would remain less than 2.5 per cent each. This would be "a reasonable rate," he said.

It would be for another generation, he said, what real changes were necessary, but "the one thing we can say is that the cost of the plan is not as serious as some have claimed."

He said that the rate might go up to 2 1/2 per cent, but that it is not likely to be a big increase.
