THAT RECIPROCITY TREATY.

This expected has happened. The commissioners who went to Washington to negotiate a reciprocity treaty between Canada and the United States have returned to Ottawa, and, in the language of the despatches, at the last meeting of the Cabinet they assured their colleagues that there was small prospect of obtaining such a treaty. When the Liberals were out of office they told the people that they could easily obtain a reciprocity treaty with the United States. But the task does not seem to be such an easy one after all, and the treaty is apparently as far off as ever.

The Liberal papers have been preparing the people for this news for some time past. For instance the Washington correspondent of the Montreal Herald had this to say not very long ago:

"Those of the Canadian members of the Joint High Commission who did not leave Washington early this morning for their home, spent the morning in saying adieu to their friends and in preparing to depart this afternoon and tonight. There is a feeling among some of them that the negotiations thus far have not been altogether favorable to Canada, but the brief January session of the commissioners will be used to correct some of the matters which are least satisfactory."

"The fact has developed that at yesterday's meeting the American members took the initiative in every proposal, and these propositions were not always most generous. In fact, there was an evident tendency among the American members to use the whip hand as if Canada's representatives were more than they for an international agreement, which certainly is not the case."

"At the session yesterday some definite propositions were made in regard to the reciprocity schedule, which were to be taken into consideration by the Canadians during the holiday recess. It seems to be settled that Canada will be given free coal, but that is an item of least importance to the United States. Free lumber assuredly has not been granted. The United States commissioners agree to pay Canada about \$500,000 for her claim in Behring Sea. The Canadian proposition for free fish is rejected unjustifiably, and finally probably, Canada grants the United States the right to build and maintain warships on the lakes, which was a concession of course on the part of the northern neighbors of the States."

This extract from the Herald goes to show that every concession of any value to Canada that was asked for was promptly rejected. But if Sir Wilfrid was not able to obtain any concessions, he seems to have been quite capable of making a few. Among other things it appears to be settled that the Premier has agreed to the abrogation of the treaty of 1817, and that the United States will be at liberty to build and maintain any number of warships on the lakes. He has also, apparently, consented to the surrender of Canada's sealing rights on the high seas upon condition that this country shall be paid for some sealing craft and tackle which the purchasers are desirous of obtaining at a profit. Canada's public rights on the high seas have also been given up and she is thus exposed to foreign invasion. How will Sir Wilfrid's holiday offering be appreciated?

THE WORLD'S LETTER BAG.

It is pointed out by a writer in one of the London papers that two-thirds of all the letters which pass through the post-offices of the world are written by and sent to people who speak English. There are substantially 500,000,000 persons speaking colloquially one or another of the ten or twelve chief modern languages, and of these about 25 per cent., or 150,000,000 persons, speak English. About 99,000,000 speak Russian, 75,000,000 German, 55,000,000 French, 45,000,000 Spanish, 35,000,000 Italian, and 12,000,000 Portuguese, and the balance Hungarian, Dutch, Polish, Flemish, Bohemian, Gaelic, Roumanian, Swedish, Finnish, Danish, and Norwegian. Thus, while only one-quarter of those who employ the facilities of the postal depart-

ments of civilized Governments speak, as their native tongue, English, two-thirds of those who correspond do so in the English language. This situation arises from the fact that so large a share of the commercial business of the world is done in English, even among those who do not speak English as their native language. There are, for instance, more than 20,000 post offices in India, the business of which in letters and papers aggregates more than 300,000,000 parcels in a year, and the business of these offices is done chiefly in English, though of India's total population, which is nearly 300,000,000, fewer than 300,000 speak or understand English. Though 90,000,000 speak or understand Russian, the business of the Russian Post Department is relatively small, the number of letters sent through the Czar's empire amounting to less than one-tenth the number mailed in Great Britain alone, though the population of Great Britain is considerably less than one-half of the population of Russia in Europe.

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

—The Patriot says the Petrel experiment was endorsed by many of the strongest Conservative business men in the community! But the Patriot is not to be taken seriously.

—A decided novelty in the war of newspaper enterprise is announced from Lapland. The first paper in that country has appeared. It was written upon a single sheet of paper, and is published every Sunday.

—Dr Manqui, the superintendent of the great lunatic asylum of St Anne, in Paris, has found that lying in bed is the finest cure for nervous disorders. Lying in bed is also said to be a valuable remedy for "that tired feeling."

—The Patriot, after several weeks silence, has deemed it prudent to touch upon the Wise letter. "W" never refused to publish a letter from Mr. Wise," it says, "and hope and trust we will never have to." Perhaps the Patriot will tell us why the letter was not published.

—Lord Kitchener's punishment for drunkenness, which has passed into a British army proverb, is to fit out the culprit in full marching equipment, a matter of 60 pounds, and compel him for six hours to march, carrying a 50-pound bag of shot in either hand.

—The attempt of the Patriot to make trouble between the farmers and THE EXAMINER is beside the mark, and being based upon false premises will fall flat. THE EXAMINER has always been zealous in promoting the interests of the agricultural community and the province generally. But it has no use for political tricksters and sham patriots.

—The Halifax Herald concludes an interesting review of the facts in connection with the Farquharson-Wise episode as follows: Mr Farquharson is entitled to no more credit for originality than is Mr Wise. They are both imitators of others, and the method pursued is the dominant Grit method of government. Mr Wise kicked to get something for himself like most of the other grits in the country and he got something from the government like most of the other grits who are not still kicking. It is the same method everywhere under the present regime—government by "Government favors."
