New Seawall Contract Awarded Toronto Firm

A \$72,824 contract covering added improvements to Charlottetown's waterfront has been awarded to Intrusion-Prepakt Limited of Toronto, Heath Macquarrie, M.P. for Queens announced last night.

Work on the federal project which comprises the construction of a seawall from Spynsey Street to the southeast corner of the naval property will commence immediately, Mr. Macquarrie added.

In all seven bids were received, the Queens M.P. stated. Clive Currie, district engineer for the federal public works department said that the wall would adjoin the southern extremity of the new wall now being built by the city and would be built in an arc averaging 15 feet from the present structure.

Consisting of concrete built on piles, the new breastwork would be similar to the new City wall in all respects, Mr. Currie said.

Ch'town Teacher Is Honored For Sharpshooting Prowess

An Alexandria school teacher, one of Canada's top women sharpshooters, and the only woman ever to qualify and travel to England as a member of the official Canadian Bisley Team, Lieut. Mary MacLennan has been signally honored by the Macdonald Tobacco Company of Montreal.

Mary qualified in Ottawa at the annual Dominion of Canada Association prize meet in 1956 and travelled with the team for the 1951 competitions at Bisley, turning in a better than average performance. Lt. MacLennan also captained the team which captured the famous Kaliper Cup for Canada, that year.

The honor to Lt. MacLennan was in the form of a one hundred per cent increase in the company's contribution to the Provincial Rifle Association's annual prize meet. In addition an award or trophy to be known as the Mary MacLennan award was also given.

The company has directed that this award is to be presented to the tyro making the highest aggregate score in the Macdonald Tobacco Co. match.

This match consists of the firing of seven shots at each of the 200, 500 and 600 yard ranges, with a possible total of 105 points. The first two stages will be fired in the forenoon of Friday, July 24th, starting at 9:45. The third stage will be run off immediately after the luncheon break on the same day.

The winners will be declared shortly before 3.00 p.m. Friday July 24.

June Shows Big Decrease

Only 493 cars of potatoes left the province this June while a year ago there were 897. This decrease of 404 dropped the total exports by rail from 1,156 in June 1958 to 749 in the comparable month of this year.

At the same time imports via the Cape Tormentine - Borden C. N. R. route rose from 1,645 last year to 1,713 in June 1959. Sandstone and gravel accounted for an increase of 162 cars, as 468 were ferried this June compared to 326 last year.

Of the imports 1,250 cars to points between Charlottetown, Borden and Summerside with 255 going west of Summerside and the remaining 208 to points east and south of Charlottetown.

There were 462 carloads of export originating at points between Charlottetown, Borden and Summerside, 111 from east and south of Charlottetown, and 176 from west of Summerside.

Principal exports, with the 1958 figures in brackets, were: livestock 119 (90); less carloads 20 (65); meats 18 (25); turnips 24 (0); canned goods 11 (11); pulpwood 0 (21); scrap iron 2 (2).

The leading imports were: autos 47 (65); coal 43 (45); fruits 7 (10); flour and feed 116 (124); fertilizer 98 (94); eggs and oils 99 (92); lime 151 (205); lumber 12 (23); less carloads 153 (222); meats 12 (21); machinery 22 (19); sugar 10 (21); salt 10 (14); canned goods 18 (19); brick and cement 63 (64); burlap 10 (10); asphalt 135 (61).

ROTARIANS HEAR MINISTER

Basic Racial Problem Mostly One Of Religion

"The basic problem is a religious one," Rev. William T. Warren said in addressing Rotarians at their luncheon meeting yesterday at the Charlottetown Hotel on some of the problems encountered with racial integration.

Stressing the equality of the love of God, the speaker said we are all one in this respect, regardless of talents.

"Doctors, lawyers and many other highly educated negroes in the United States are running elevators, working as porters and at other jobs because they are not accepted on the basis of their talents," he said.

"Negroes are well liked as individuals but hated and feared as groups, as indicated in the regard families have for nursemaids, handymen employees, etc."

Mr. Warren described the efforts of 70,000 whites in an extended area of Philadelphia over a period of ten years, to prevent housing facilities going to negroes well able to pay their way. "A couple of Communists on the Human Relations Committee added to the difficulty of getting anywhere for several years but at the end of these there was a refreshing one. A young man obviously still in a blissful state and oblivious to any mundane happenings, wanted to know if he could have an engagement announcement put in the paper."
