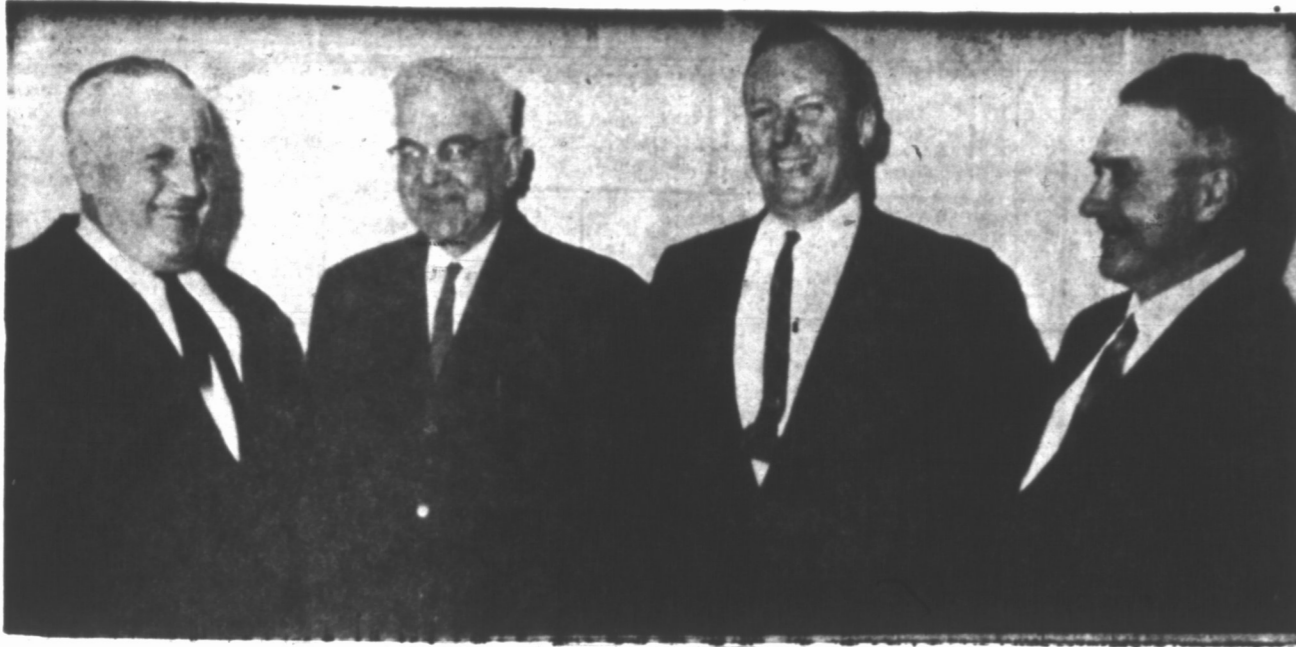

FINAL HOUSE BUSINESS

Qualified Adviser Suggested To Aid New P.E.I. Industries

A recommendation that a qualified person be employed to look into every aspect of the establishment of new industries in the province was contained in the report of the select standing committee on industries, resources, fisheries and transportation, considered in the Legislature yesterday.

It was suggested that "anyone undertaking this promotional work should first make a very complete study of our own province to determine what we have to offer and where. Such a man could act in an advisory capacity to whatever board might be set up to consider applications from businesses and offer more than a number of business and professional men on it as well as a minister of government."

Regarding resources, the committee felt that a program to restore game bird population and to guard against further depletion should be implemented. It was also suggested that all fish ponds in the province be supervised by a provincial manager of fish and game.

The report read "with respect to the problem of limitation on lobster gear, advocated by the majority of those in the industry as a means of conservation, it was considered that further study was required in this field and that considerable organization was necessary at the fishermen's level."

Training was seen as a prime need in the off-shore fishery operations. Our department of fisheries has arranged this type of training for our fishermen at Pictou, N.S.

Grave concern was expressed over the abuse of conservation regulations respecting the lobster industry in certain areas. According to the report, "fishermen could do a better job of policing among themselves. It was thought advisable to recommend more stringent penalties by heavier fines and the loss of fishing licenses after the second offence in one season."

The report also contained a recommendation that every effort be made to have the second Abegweit in service by 1967. It also urged that the full schedule of the Borden-Cape Tormentine ferries extend to Jan 5 with an 11 o'clock night crossing added. Landscaping was suggested around the ferry terminals and the committee felt that native stone arches were needed at Borden and Wood Islands. Mr. MacGowan's committee also asked that the passenger coach service (CNR) to the western section of the province be continued.

The report also contained a recommendation that plans be made immediately to see to it that no congestion was in evidence at Wood Islands and Caribou in 1967. It also asked for a trip at 8 p.m. and urged the Maritime Transport Commission to install lights at Wood Islands and Caribou to enable night crossings.

The committee made public a request from the Prince Edward Island Truckers Association that the new fuel act be not enforced.
