

Teachers' Study Group Meets At Belle River

A Teachers' Study Group meeting was held in Belle River School recently with an attendance of thirteen members and the supervisor, Mr. Willard Brehaut.

Miss Edythe MacDonald was appointed as president and Chris Nicholson as secretary.

Considerable discussion took place concerning the achievement tests for Grade VIII. It was agreed that the present achievement tests be eliminated and introduce the entrance type, which should be conducted in the same manner as the present type, having the papers corrected by the department or supervisor plus some assistants. It was also agreed that there be standardized tests for all the grades.

The decisions reached regarding the high percentage of unsuccessful 1950 entrance candidates were: 1. Feasibility to read question papers intelligently and comprehensively.

2. Weak in elementary work. 3. Some exams too difficult for a grade ten pupil. 4. Some candidates write for the experience with no intention of passing.

It was agreed that the teacher who remained in the same school had more interest in that particular school and there would be no loss of time in the fall in getting to know the pupils. It was also agreed that frequent shifting of teachers would be helpful when a teacher was weak in certain subjects.

Mr. Willard Brehaut stressed that teachers be very cautious in completing annual and statistical report forms as they had been made out too hurriedly, which led to all the inaccuracies.

Mr. Brehaut also stressed the great need of installation of sanitary facilities in the schools.

The reading programme was considered excellent. "Mathematics We Use" was very much disliked by most teachers. The chief reason was that the pupil could not get a clear idea of arithmetic.

"Canada A Nation" was considered to be too vague and difficult. It had to be given in outline form. It was decided that all history books should contain many pictures and maps.

"Canada and her Neighbours" was agreed by all to be a very interesting book. Other topics which received discussion were: Chalkboards, new furniture for seating pupils and lighting, after which the meeting adjourned.

Ordination At Morell On Sunday

Rev. Reginald L. Phelan of Morell Rear was ordained to the Holy Priesthood Sunday by His Excellency Bishop James Boyle in the Church of the Little Flower in the Village.

His Excellency celebrated Mass assisted by Rev. J. A. Sullivan of St. Dunstan's University and Rev. Eric Robin, North Rustico. Father Phelan was assisted during the services by his parish priest, Rev. Phelan MacKenna.

The sermon was preached by Rev. R. G. Ellsworth of St. Dunstan's University. Following Mass the Bishop spoke briefly. Rev. P. F. MacDonald, Chancellor of the Diocese, was master of ceremonies.

Other clergy present in the sanctuary were: Right Rev. J. A. Murphy, Souris; Right Rev. R. V. MacKenzie, Rector of St. Dunstan's University; Rev. K. C. MacPherson, Rev. J. B. Croken, Rev. J. P. E. O'Hanley, Rev. Charles MacCarthy, Rev. Harold Croken, Rev. O. P. Wood, and Rev. Thomas Butler.

A very large congregation witnessed the ordination ceremonies at the end of which Father Phelan bestowed his personal blessing on his relatives. The newly ordained priest will celebrate his first Solemn Mass in Morell Church next Sunday.

Father Phelan graduated from St. Dunstan's University in 1947 with his Bachelor of Arts Degree. He studied Theology at the Grand Seminary in Montreal.

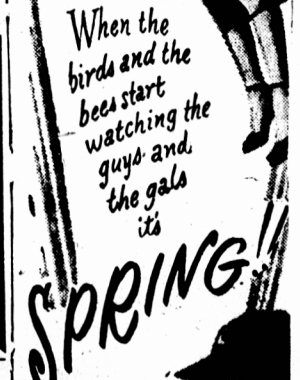

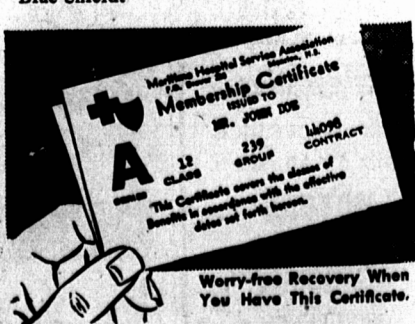
