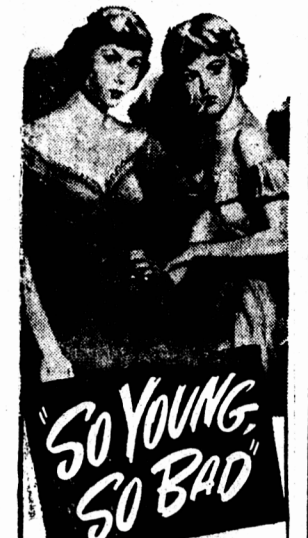

Pressing For Higher Gravel Trucking Rates
The truck drivers hauling gravel for the County Construction Company to the Georgetown road are planning refusal to haul any more gravel beginning Thursday morning unless trucking rates are raised, it was learned yesterday.
The truckmen had previously decided to make the deadline this morning, but learned later that Premier J. W. Jones would not return to the Island until Wednesday or Thursday. A delegation of the truckmen has been appointed to wait on Mr. Jones on Thursday, and until word is received from this delegation, the truckmen will refuse to haul gravel.
The present trucking rate schedule established by the government is as follows: The normal load carried by the trucks is four yards.
Ten cents per yard per mile for the first five miles.
Eight cents per yard per mile for the next ten miles.
Six cents per yard per mile for mileage above fifteen miles.
The truckmen want a two cent boost across the board in the above rates.
Further, the government rate per hour for hauling clay for fill in jobs is \$2.50. The truckmen want this rate raised to \$3.00 per hour.
Two years ago the truckmen made a similar request to the Government to have the rates raised, but they were unsuccessful. At this time, in view of the added cost of living, they are once again presenting their request for a boost in the rates.
