CAUTION JUDGMENT ON FIGURES Ontario Only Province on Black on Tax Split

By DON HARRIGT OTTAWA (CP)—In the 1961-62 fiscal year the federal government spent more in Quebec than it raised there. The same was true for every province except Ontario.

This is one broad conclusion that can be drawn from Ottawa's first attempt to allocate federal expenditures and revenues by provinces.

The results, bound to be controversial, are shown in material table in the Commons by Finance Minister Gougeon at the request of Leo Baker, Quebec leader of the Conservative caucus, who asked particularly about his province's position.

Everywhere in the material is the warning "use with caution." The government notes it had to make a great many assumptions in allocating both income and outgo among the provinces. With alternative assumptions, many analysts could have significantly different results.

WHAT OF CNR? For example, how does one allocate the \$1.1 billion among the provinces? What of the CNR deficit? And debt payments to bond holders? And how do you apportion among the provinces the federal revenues from sales and excise taxes?
