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MR. AUGUSTINE C. MACDONALD, OPPOSITION CANDIDATE FOR KING'S.

Mr. Augustine C. MacDonald, member of the late Parliament, and once more the popular standard bearer of the Liberal-Conservative party for the riding of King's, was born at Panmure, Prince Edward Island, in 1837. He received his education at the Georgetown Grammar School and the Central Academy, Charlottetown. He is at present a resident of Montague. In his boyhood he went into business which he has prosecuted up to the present time. He entered public life in 1870, when he was elected a member of the Provincial Legislature for the Cardigan district, and took part in the discussion which led to Confederation, of which he was an early advocate. On the consummation of Confederation he was elected to the House of Commons, and was one of the old guard who stood by Sir John McDonald in the crisis of 1873. He contested King's in every election since Confederation. Twice he was defeated, but in each instance he was returned at the following general election. Mr. MacDonald, has, during the course of his Parliamentary life, taken part in many important discussions,

always showing a close acquaintance with the subjects upon which he spoke, and has invariably been heard from with effect on questions affecting the interests of Prince Edward Island. His speech on the claims of the Maritime Provinces to the amount awarded to Canada under the Washington Treaty, was one of the clearest and most convincing arguments addressed to Parliament on that question. He took strong ground in support of the National Policy and the construction of the Canadian Pacific Railway. While still in the vigor of life he has enjoyed the satisfaction of seeing his opponents trying to get the people to forget that they opposed the first of these great questions; while they are feebly imitating the second. He was one of the earliest advocates of Preferential Trade within the Empire. During his long public life Mr. MacDonald has enjoyed the confidence of his friends and the respect of his political opponents, who will readily admit that not even the noblest Chief of the Clan to which he is proud to belong ever bore a whiter plume than Augustine C. MacDonald.

FAMILY BLOWN UP.

An Outrage in Arkansas

HOT SPRINGS, Ark., Oct. 17.—A father, mother and four young children were blown to atoms last evening at Sells, Montgomery County, 14 miles from here.

It is believed that a dispute over a homestead claim prompted the outrage. The county officials wired last night that they were close on the track of the guilty person.

BRITISH ELECTIONS.

Government's Majority Will be 130.

LONDON, Oct. 17.—The election returns today do not change the results, and the final figures, with the exception of the Orkney Islands, leave the Government a net gain of one seat.

The total number of members now elected is 669; Ministerials, 400; Opposition, 269.

As the Orkney Islands district is regarded as a safe Liberal seat, the Government's majority will be 130 against 129 at the time of dissolution.

BANDS OF BOERS.

Engagements at Heidelberg, in which British Succeeded, but Lose Some Men.

LONDON, Oct. 17.—Lord Roberts reports from Pretoria, under date of Oct. 15 h, as follows:

"French started from Machelodorp towards Heidelberg to clear part of the country not yet visited by our troops.

"Mahon, commanding the mounted troops, successfully engaged the enemy on Oct. 13th. But our losses were severe, three officers and eight men being killed and three officers and twenty-five men wounded.

"French occupied Carolina yesterday, capturing a convoy during the march."

Lord Roberts also reports a number of minor affairs; showing that the Boers are still active over a large area.
