### Althea Gibson Advances To 4th Round

MANCHESTER, England (AP)—Althea Gibson of New York advanced to the fourth round of the women's singles in the Northern Lawn Tennis Tournament Wednesday. She defeated Mrs. Heather Brewer of Bermuda in a rain-plagued match 6-3, 6-1.

Barry McKay of Ann Arbor, Michigan, won two matches to go into the quarter finals of the men's singles. He defeated Indian Davis Cup player Ramanathan Krishnan 6-2, 13-11 in the third round and a few hours later defeated Gordon Forbes of South Africa, 7-9, 6-4, 6-4.

### Tex Gonzales Gains Decision

NEW YORK (AP)—Tony (Tex) Gonzales of East Orange, N.Y., floored Hardy Bazooka Smallwood in the first round and dealt a fierce shellacking to Brooklyn middleweight Monday night to gain a unanimous decision in a bout at St. Nicholas Arena. St. Alwood weighed 160½, Gonzales 158½.

Besides knocking Smallwood down in the first heat with a left and right to the jaw, Gonzales also staggered Smallwood in the third, eighth, ninth and tenth rounds. At the finish, Smallwood, a 6-5 favorite, was out over and under his left eye and bled from the nose.

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## AMONG THE FARMERS

### THE DIE IS CAST

While it is difficult to state what percentage of seeding and planting is completed there is no doubt that, if not now, certainly within the next week the farmer will have committed his 1956 crop fate to the unpredictable forces of nature. It is now clear that hay, harvesting and potato digging will be much later than usual and particularly with the later crop, this can be a significant factor in relation to disease, yield, and harvesting conditions. Late springs are very often followed by good crops, but this again depends upon moisture, heat and hours of sunlight and as was stated earlier to these the farmer has now committed his fate.

**GRASS SEED THOUGHTS**  
On a mixed farm one of the major bills connected with cropping is the one for grass and clover seeds. Where farmers have a limited acreage it is necessary in order to maintain rotations to limit the number of years in hay to either two or three years. This means that each year a fairly large percentage of arable acreage must be seeded down, an operation which adds to the cost of producing hay and the time and labour involved in putting in the crop.

For many years there has been practically no change in the method of seeding grass and clover seeds. Practically all grain drills have grass seed boxes which broadcast the seeds which are partially covered by the grain drill and the operation of covering completed in a hit and miss fashion with a light harrow. Recently there has been appearing on the market machines especially designed for sowing grass seeds, most of them having a roller and cover the seeds through the action of pressing the ground with a corrugated roller. The new machines are said to give a more uniform stand to effect through better germination a considerable saving in the amount of seed required.

**ROYAL SHOW**  
We have received a descriptive folder of the Royal Show sponsored by the Royal Agricultural Society of England and which will be held at Newcastle upon Tyne July 3-6.

On the first day 600 classes of livestock will be judged and on the second day Her Majesty The Queen Mother will visit the fair. The size of the show may be judged from the fact that the grounds are enclosed by a fence of half miles long. Features of the Canadian shows are parades of fox hounds, pit ponies, demonstration of sheep dogs at work all mixed with displays of draught horses, jumpers and musical rides. The parking lot will accommodate 30,000 vehicles and from it three entrances lead directly to the show ground. No admission fee is charged on any day after 7:00 p.m. and special prices are given where tickets are displayed by groups.

In looking over a price list of fertilizer issued in 1934 by the Prince Edward Island Potato Growers Association it is noted that not only have the prices changed but the type of fertilizer offered is also changed. Super phosphate 16 per cent in new 200 pound bags was priced at \$13.50 per ton, however, farmers were urged to buy super 20 per cent at \$18.50 per ton. It was pointed out that by so doing a saving of 70c per ton on food basis was made.

Sulphate of ammonia in 200 pound bags was \$33.00 per ton and all fertilizers were guaranteed to be in fine condition, this would be a comfort to farmers who had in previous years spent hours breaking a fertilizer with a hammer. The 200 pound bags were of course a special concession to farmers with a sore back.

Mixed fertilizers were offered in five formulas ranging in price from \$21.50 for 2-12-6 to \$27.50 for 4-13 and 24.50 for the standard for many years the 4-3-10. Steamers were to call at Souris, Georgetown, Charlottetown, and Summerside and those taking their fertilizer from the steamer would receive a discount of 50c per ton.

**LEAVES AND TREES**  
It will be generally agreed that leaves add a great deal to the appearance of the deciduous tree. It will not perhaps be generally realized that these trees are bare for a very large part of the year in this climate. This season will see leaves on the trees for a little more than four months and before the end of the period the summer clothes will be showing signs of serious wear and should there be another hurricane such as that of early September 1954

## Fisheries Tariff Probe Continues At Washington

WASHINGTON (AP)—A Gloucester, Mass., fisheries company official testified Wednesday against quotas on imports of groundfish fillets from Canada and other countries.

F. M. Bundy of the Gorton-Pew Fisheries Company, Ltd., told the tariff commission that if a quota means anything it will necessarily increase prices for the fish products to the U.S. consumers.

His testimony prompted questioning by representatives of the New England fisheries industry favoring restricted imports by raising tariffs and setting quotas.

In reply to questions by Solomon Sandler, counsel for the Gloucester Fisheries Commission, Bundy recalled that three years ago he had participated in a conference seeking a "satisfactory" figure for a quota. But he added that he believes no quota figure can be arrived at satisfactory to "both sides."

William Caffasso of the Gloucester commission testified that if present conditions continue the fleet would not be available in time of national emergency.

Testimony dealing with unemployment because of imports was offered by Victor Turpin of the Atlantic Fishermen's Union, and Manuel Lewis of the Gloucester Seafood Workers' Union.

The New England fisheries industry is asking the tariff commission to consider restricting groundfish fillets imports by raising the tariff and setting quotas linked to average United States consumption.
