

# Poulton-Edwards Fight Postponed Until Tuesday

As a result of unfavorable flying weather, the long-awaited fight between Harry Poulton and Gil Edwards of New York has been postponed for twenty-four hours. It was announced here last night by Ivan Doherty of the Boosters Club.

The fight, originally scheduled for tonight at the Forum had to be postponed when Edwards was unable to fly out of Boston yesterday.

Edwards' co-manager Bob Friday, who is accompanying the fighter here, phoned from Boston and was advised to take a train or bus.

It is believed that the fighter will arrive here this afternoon or tonight. However the Boosters Club, unwilling to take a chance on his missing a connection, decided that the fight should be delayed for a day.

The original plans called for Edwards and his manager to travel here by train. They were forwarded train tickets by the Boosters Club but last Wednesday Friday called Doherty and stated they wanted to fly in. They were supposed to be here Saturday but apparently they were unable to make the right plane connections.

Officials of the Boosters Club expressed regret at the unavoidable delay of the fight which has started no more interest in local boxing circles than only fight staged here for a long time.

Harry Poulton arrived here from Halifax Saturday evening after three weeks of hard training in the Shearwater Gym. When Harry goes

into the ring Tuesday night he will be fighting at the heaviest weight of his career.

During the past month Harry has developed into a heavy middleweight and he now tips the scales at 159 pounds. He has added weight around the shoulders and chest and he attributes the extra poundage to the long and strenuous workouts and punching exercises at Shearwater.

He figures that the extra pounds will be quite an asset for his fight with Edwards. For one thing he feels stronger and he believes that he can put more zip in his punches.

A cold in his right shoulder has forced him to ease up on his workouts during the last two or three days. His physician Dr. W. R. Carson has given him heat treatments and the shoulder will be back in perfect shape by fight time.

Mitch Krawada, the lightweight-wrestler from Sydney who met Austin Squarebriggs in the semi-final arrived in town yesterday and is in tip-top condition. Krawada has been working out in Sydney with Al Hogan, the White Hope Champion. LeRoy Jones of Halifax, who wrestled Bud Ramsay at the Forum at 6.30. If Edwards arrives this afternoon he will likely workout at the same time.
