Egg And Poultry Market Report

Egg receipts on P. E. I. are reported slightly less than last week. The decrease is being lessened by the general increase in pullet receipts. Quality as reported is improving. Shipments are being made to other Atlantic Provinces and Montreal. Prices are somewhat erratic at present. Registered grading stations are quoting producers for ungraded eggs: A Large 58; A Medium 48; A Small and Grade B, 40; Grade C 32.

Dealers are now quoting for the Graded Pack A Large 66; A Medium 56; A Small and Grade B 48; Grade C 40. Retailers are paying for A Large 68-69; A Medium 58-59; A small and Grade B 50-51. Graded C 43. Until supplies in retail stores are cleaned up there will be little change in consumer prices, but a gradual decrease will be made as the lower prices take effect. Poultry receipts are increasing. Prices remain unchanged from last week.

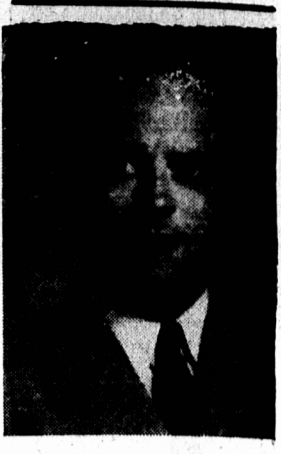
