Telegraphic Odds and Ends.

A BUDGET OF GENERAL NEWS FROM ALL PARTS OF THE WORLD.

OTTAWA, August 2.—Reports to the fishery department say the number of salmon in Fraser River this season are perfectly marvelous. Its canneries have been compelled to recall their boats, owing to the enormous quantities of fish.

Supt. Gibson says the Canadian cable via Belleisle will be laid as soon as a charter is obtained, and the necessary capital has been raised.

The Canadian Pacific will appeal from Judge Armour's judgment in the Conner and McLellan suit of a quarter million against the company.

Two range lights have been established by the Government off Darnely, Prince County, North Shore, Prince Edward Island.

Inspector Borradiello is authorized to administer oaths of allegiance to inland revenue officers.

PARIS, August 2.—The manager of Rochefort's paper, the Inter-sigant, who was arrested on a charge of stealing and publishing documents submitted to and depositions taken before high court of senate in the case of General Boulanger, was arraigned to-day. He testified that he received the documents from parties in London.

OTTAWA, Aug. 2.—The steamer W. F. McRae, owned at Wallaceburg, has been seized at Chatham for landing goods without reporting inward or outward.

LONDON, Aug. 2.—Brilliant sunshine and cool breezes prevailed at Portsmouth this morning. Preparations for the reception of Emperor William of Germany were completed at an early hour.

The town is handsomely decorated and in holiday attire. An enormous flotilla of craft, consisting of warships and private vessels, covers the harbor, while the shore is densely crowded with people.

When the German imperial yacht Hohenzollern with the Emperor on board was sighted the Prince of Wales on board the royal yacht Osborne started down the harbor to meet the Emperor, and salutes were fired from forts and warships.

When the Osborne approached near the Hohenzollern, the Prince of Wales signalled hearty greetings to the Emperor, who responded. The two yachts then passed through the lines of ironclads and proceeded to Cowes.

All the war vessels were trimmed with bunting, and as the yachts passed the yards were manned by seamen. On reaching Cowes the Emperor landed at Trinity pier, where the Prince of Wales who had already landed, bade him welcome.

The Emperor and suite and Prince of Wales then entered carriages, and accompanied by military escort, were driven to Osborne, where the Emperor was received by the Queen.
