

Red Oarsmen Are Competing In International Rowing

LONDON (CP) — A new athletic struggle between East and West will highlight this year's royal regatta opening July 3 on the famous "straight course" at Henley-on-Thames.

Back in strength this year after a one-year absence is a 24-man Russian contingent. Red oarsmen will compete in five events. Arranged against them are crews from Australia, Britain, France, Holland, Italy, Sweden and the United States.

Canada, which knocked the Russians out of the Grand Challenge event when they last put in an appearance in 1955, is not represented this year.

EIGHT-OARED FEATURE
Main interest centres in the Grand Challenge Cup for eight-oared shells, in which Russia will be represented by the Krasnoe Znamia club. Russia started the rowing world when she won this event in 1954, and the Krylia Sovetov crew that pulled the trick is counted one of the finest ever to pull oars on the Thames.

In 1955 Canada's famous University of British Columbia eight eliminated the Russians in a race still regarded as a Henley "classic" but in the final the Canadians were beaten by half-length by the University of Pennsylvania.

Other entries for the Grand Challenge include the defending Centre Sportif de l'Armee Française and last year's runners-up the Three Crowns Club from Sweden. Others include Britain's Cambridge University and Leander Club crews, the Njord Students from Holland and two

It Would Have Been A Memorable Boxing Match

NEW YORK (AP) — The National Boxing Association has smeared up what undoubtedly was going to be Jack Hurley's masterpiece on canvas.

He was in the throes of creating this masterpiece to end this masterpiece when the NBA stepped in to daub it up. Only a man with the touch of genius would dream up a championship match between two heavyweight fist-fighting champions.

Promoter Hurley, granted the northwest territorial rights to professional champion Floyd Patterson, faced what to a lesser man would be an insurmountable barrier. Where would he find an opponent who would be a worthy challenger to the answer was easy. Peter Rademacher, an ex-football player who won the heavyweight title in the Olympic Games in Australia, was willing and available. Furthermore, with his following in that territory there was bound to be enough local interest to guarantee a good gate.

As a home-town pride, if an unknown quantity in the professional ranks, Rademacher was just the man to tackle Patterson in his first pro fight, and maybe his last. But the NBA, which had overlooked some of the opponents in Joe Louis' bum-of-the-month campaign, suddenly decided a match between the pro champion and a fighter who never had struck a blow for money was ridiculous, out of the question, even unthinkable.

It was thinkable, all right, as Hurley's fertile and ever-active brain had thought of it. Rademacher might have taken a beating, but probably no worse than he took as a Washington State football player.

We are sorry the NBA has taken such an attitude. The match whetted our imagination.

Says Royals Will Have New Manager Soon

MONTREAL (AP) — General manager E. J. (Buzzie) Bavasi of the Brooklyn Dodgers says Montreal Royals of the International League will have a new manager within three or four days but added he had no idea who he would be.

Bavasi termed a report Tuesday that Goldie Holt, now manager of the Macon, Ga., team in the Sally League, would soon be at the helm of the Royals as "not only erroneous but premature."

Broken down, P "asi's" quotes can be interpreted that Holt will not manage the Montreal club this year but probably next year.

"Goldie is perfectly capable of handling the Montreal club," said Bavasi, "but he is perfectly satisfied to stay where he is and we are happy to have him remain there. He thinks he can bring the Macon club up higher than its current sixth-place standing and we agree with him."

The Montreal club currently is being managed by Al Roming, the Royals' catcher. Greg Mulleavy, who began the season at the Royals' helm, resigned June 14 because of the poor showing of the team. He was temporarily replaced by Al Campanis, field director of the farm club of the parent Dodgers. Roming took over several days ago.

"We expect to name a Montreal manager within three or four days," said Bavasi. "Right now I have no idea who he will be."

First Cultural Grants Announced

STRATFORD, Ont. (CP) — Chair man Brooke Claxton of the Canada Council today announced the council's first two grants in aid of Canadian cultural projects.

Grants of \$10,000 were made to the Canadian Players of Stratford and to Le Theatre du Nouveau Monde of Montreal.

The grants, announced at a party following the Stratford Shakespearean Company's opening performance, Hamlet, are to enable the two companies to carry on their work of spreading knowledge of the drama in Canada. Both groups are expected as a condition of accepting them to tour the country from coast to coast.

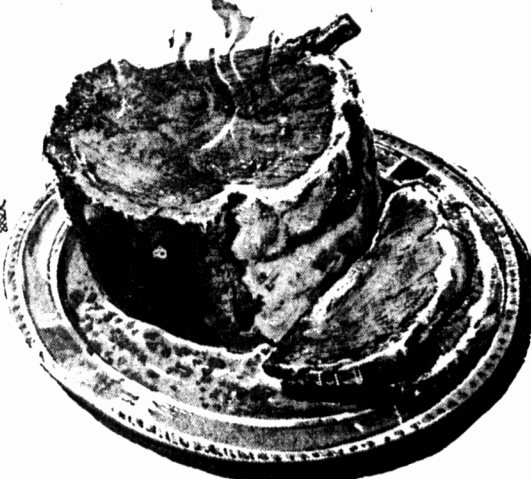
